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THE RED CROSS The appeal of the Red Cross at this annual time of roll-call, is definite to the person who can possibly afford it.

This county, through the work of the local Red Cross agencies and through the help accorded with flour and cracked wheat has seen that the benefits of this great organization are not entirely confined to remote corners of the globe, but has answered the need right in this community.

It is a coincidence that at the very time the roll call is underway, a dramatic instance of the part the Red Cross plays in humanity's care is seen in the catastrophe which has come to Cuba, and of course the need for the Red Cross is being answered there as it is always answered throughout civilization when disaster takes its toll.

All who can should respond to the appeal of the Red Cross just as the latter never fails to answer when it is summoned to combat suffering and need at the least expected time and place.

WAR DEBTS The unprecedented act of President Hoover in calling for a conference this week with the Democratic presidential nominee, Franklin D. Roosevelt, is no less inspiring than the frankness in its report, for the president recognizes that the war-debt situation demands unparalleled consideration and unified co-operation from the outgoing and incoming administrations.

And it is true also, that dry as the subject appears, it is of incalculable concern to the most lowly of us. We all must recognize that our individual prosperity is wrapped up quite as much in adequately solving the problems of the world as in raising the price of beans and potatoes, and wheat. This latter cannot permanently come until certain basic factors such as war debts, reparations, economic barriers, and disarmaments are satisfactorily adjusted, so as to re-establish relations with vast consuming hordes who can only buy when they have the wherewithal.

Great Britain and France put the debt reduction issue squarely up to this country in notes made public by the state department. They asked fundamental questions of our \$3,000,000,000 (B) obligation. Pending negotiations to this end, they requested delay on Dec. 15 payments of nearly \$124,000,000.

The President wants his successor's ideas on war debts and other economic issues because these questions are certain to carry over into the Roosevelt administration. Any debt settlement will rest finally with the Democratic congress.

The British-French attack on the war debt structure is regarded by Mr. Hoover as the opening wedge in a general campaign for reduction of Europe's \$11,000,000,000 (B) debt to the United States.

In a resolution adopted last December Congress shouted a resounding "no" to possible future requests for debt revision. Now the question is: Shall Congress be asked to change its mind. The administration wants Mr. Roosevelt's advice before drafting recommendations.

Because of its far-reaching implications for both world economic recovery and domestic politics, because of the impending change of government, the debt problem is particularly knotty at this time. Yet the course of world history may depend on a clear-cut resolution.

The gist of the British and French notes is briefly this:

Mr. Hoover last October, in the Hoover-Laval communique, recognized that further adjustments in debt and reparations might be necessary. He advised Europe to put its own house in order before asking favors of America. Europe did this at the Lausanne reparations conference where it lifted Germany's burden.

Europe believes world recovery depends on debt reduction. Delay is costly. Let America and Europe discuss the debt structure, pending the outcome, let the December payments remain in abeyance.

The notes were not unexpected. Virtually all of the European debtors had indicated during recent months they would ask the release from at least part of their \$11,000,000,000 (B) debt, to avoid injecting the dynamic issue into a political campaign. However, they waited until after the elections.

Now Mr. Hoover is doing the statesmanlike thing in revealing to Mr. Roosevelt the first of the great problems to which his administration will fall heir.

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
