EXECUTION VIEWED BY 41 PERSONS MONDAY

Prison Physician Listens to Victim's Heart While Outside Chamber

STATE PRISONER GARRISON CITY, WYO., (UP)—

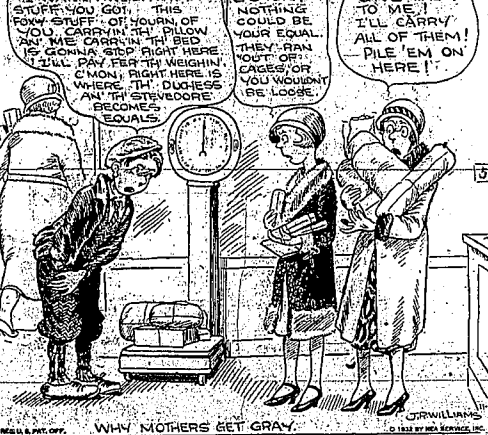

CORRUPTION AT THE POLLS
Testimony offered the House sub-committee about vote-buying, intimidation and what-not at the polls in Philadelphia during the last election does not make very encouraging reading, but there is no reason for anyone to be really surprised by it.

That sort of thing is simply the price we pay for permitting unscrupulous political machines to dominate our large cities. The Vare outfit, which stands incised in this particular instance, is charged with no more than Tammany has done repeatedly in New York; no more than Chicago has seen dozens of times.

Nor will that sort of thing end until the great machines are broken. And the machines won't be broken until the average man takes a far keener and more intelligent interest in his local government than he has ever taken yet.

ON THE WAY (Oregon Journal)
A well nigh universal feeling of returning confidence has followed the recent election.

This belief is announced by many Oregon Republicans who voted for Mr. Hoover. They say frankly that the overwhelming character of the verdict in itself has powerful effect in renewing confidence. And exactly the same condition is expressed by many of the great business and industrial leaders beyond the Mississippi.

And what else but such faith can come from public expressions since election by the president-elect? He said:

Our task now is to seek to re-establish foreign markets for our surplus production, of meeting the problem of underconsumption, of distributing wealth and products more equitably.

To re-establish foreign markets for our surplus production? What a splendid thing that would be for our wheat! What a splendid thing that would be for all our farm products to be afforded foreign markets, such as they used to have, and what a service that would be to our farmers! And since these exported surpluses would again give old-time prices and old-time buying power to our farmers, what a boon that would be to the towns and cities, with their goods and supplies that in decent times, farmers buy!

To meet the problem of underconsumption? That was Mr. Roosevelt's second key proposal. Isn't that what the country's industrialists want—restored consumption? Isn't that what is wanted by the business men in the cities and towns—restored consumption? What better program could any president-elect propose, to lead us away from this nightmare of depression!

Mr. Roosevelt's after-election statement was made in answer to questions by a Toronto newspaper man. "Is your liberalism to take the form of any Socialistic interference with private business?" queried the reporter. And Mr. Roosevelt replied:

We are traditionally American, in that we believe in private enterprise and initiative. But there is a limit to all that—and that limit is the welfare of the common people.

The same man that tells you he doesn't want to see government interfere in business is often the first to go to Washington and ask the government for a prohibitory tariff on his product. And when things get just bad enough, as they did two years ago, he will go with equal speed to the government to ask for a loan.

Many powerful groups have sought protection from the government for their own special interests, without realizing that government must favor no small group.

There could be no fairer policy. There could be no truer description of the real function of government. And asked, "What is the keystone of your policy?" Mr. Roosevelt replied:

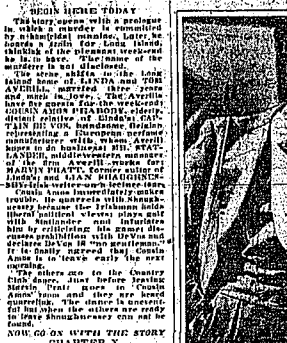
It is that everyone has a right to make a living. It is that the United States owes to everyone an avenue to possess himself of a portion of that plenty with which this land abounds.

Are't these sound policies—the right of every man to make a living—and the right of every man to have a part of the plenty with which this land abounds?

Was't this beautiful world made for a part of the folks only? Are some to have, and the rest be forgotten? Who can dispute, who wants to controvert, the splendidly human policies Mr. Roosevelt outlines above?

And why should these policies not be a wide-open highway to restored prosperity?

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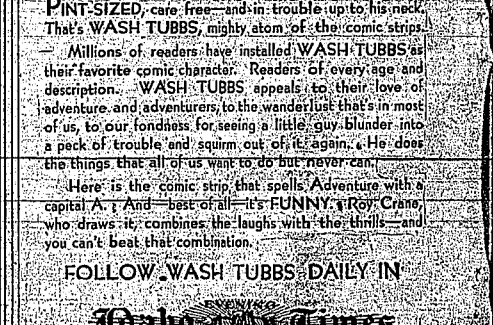
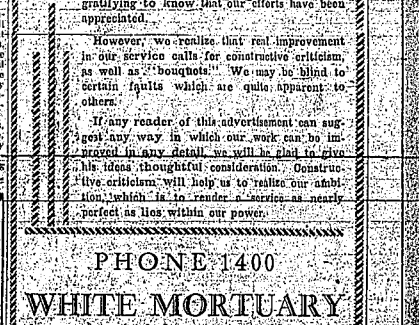
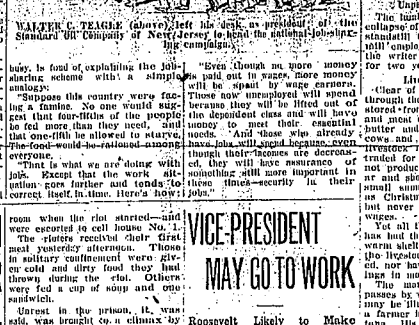
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
