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

TOO SOON TO COUNT THE TOLL It is pointed out rather frequently these days, that the death rate in the United States has not risen appreciably during the depression. People may be suffering from want, but they aren't dying from it; indeed, some have tried to prove that the average health is actually better now than it was a few years ago.

Newton D. Baker, leader in relief work, remarks, however, that we have little reason to congratulate ourselves. Such ailments as rickets, and other diseases of malnutrition and low vitality have increased during 1932, he asserts, and he predicts that within the next ten years "we shall undoubtedly reap a harvest of tuberculosis and other diseases . . . unless we redouble our efforts to maintain a decent minimum of living and health standards throughout the country."

That ominous warning is worth bearing in mind.

THE COP FROM COLLEGE It was a little bit surprising to read that Kenneth A. Rouse, recently an honor student and athletic star at the University of Chicago, has got himself a job as patrolman on the Chicago police force. College graduates, especially honor students, don't often pick that field of usefulness; one's first impulse is to wonder what on earth moved young Rouse to do it. But a little reflection indicates that the young man may be a good deal wiser than we suppose. No police department is exactly over-run by husky young men who have highly-trained minds. Indeed, that is one way, the chief thing that is wrong with police departments generally speaking.

There are few fields of endeavor where educated and conscientious men are more greatly needed. It would be a fine thing for the nation if Mr. Rouse should set a style that other collegians would like to follow. We can use a lot of cops of his variety.


