**HONEY**  
 Shell a gallon of honey granulated white corn. Put in iron dinner pot. Cover with water. Boil 20 minutes. Drain off water. Add 1/2 gallon of boiling water. Boil 20 minutes. Let this mixture stand overnight. In morning put in a hot fire and let boil 2 1/2 or 3 hours or until the honey is thick and yellow. The soap turns the corn yellow.  
 Now drain off all of the solid water. Put the corn in a glass dishpan and wash until the water is all washed off. The corn would be a great help in getting rid of the husks. Next put the corn back on the fire for a few minutes. Repeat this boiling two or three times in fresh water. The honey will be white and tender and there will be about 2 1/2 gallons.  
 Drain off all of the water and add a little salt. Put away in a glass jar. When serving, add a little orange or lemon rind, and you will find the honey very delicious.

# CAPITAL PREPARES FOR DISCONTENTS

One Hundred Extra Police Men Added to Guard at Washington

WASHINGTON (AP)—The hundred extra patrolmen will be on duty to guard the capital against looting and rioting when Congress convenes Monday. 500 men detailed today at a conference of federal police officers (officials) and sergeants-at-arms of the house and senate.

Renewed former sergeant-at-arms of the house, said federal troops would be used but that police would prevent any organized demonstration in the capital.

The meeting was called to discuss strategy against the four columns of looting marchers who are coming to the capital by their protests before Congress.

Major Ernest W. Brown, superintendent of the Metropolitan police, said there had been no change in the original policy of meeting the looting marchers at the District of Columbia. He said he would be glad to allow them to enter Washington as an organized group.

At the headquarters of the National Unemployed, council it was said no definite plan had been evolved for the looting marchers. The first step will be to call a meeting of the national committee consisting of the leaders of the various unions.

After that a mass meeting of the looting marchers will be held at the District of Columbia. It will plan its plan to the entire group.
