

BANK RE-OPENING THURSDAY BRINGS FRESH OPTIMISM

Resumption of Business Continues Two Month Period of Effort

The resumption marked the 10-weeks drive upon the part of the Bank of the Idaho Association to Twin Falls a financial institution with some 500 depositors who had their money deposited in a sum of a total value of \$100 each making up the capital stock. Patients with deposits of more than \$100 were given a certificate one-half their accounts to stack in the new institution, one-half of the balance being held in trust by the Bank of the Idaho Association, and the remainder in equal annual installments on similar dates in 1933, 1934, 1935, 1936, 1937, 1938, 1939, and 1940, so that \$200 were made immediately available.

Interest on the certificates cumulated when chief credit is given for the accomplishment. Included are G. C. Beach, M. J. Neumann, G. O. Paulsen, G. E. Hunt, Ralph Pink and Major Bohler. Many others have been added since the first certificates in accepting savings and now totaling the details incident to the reorganization, John W. Graham, president of the Bank of the Idaho Association, has been in touch with parts throughout the procedure.
