ST. LOUIS (UPI) — Dr. Squire P. Bevier, 60-year-old dentist, left a note confessing the murder of Mrs. Josephine M. Elder, 71, a county treasurer, his intention to commit suicide, police reported today.

Mrs. Elder, mother of Census court judge, was found hanged to death with a 2½ pound nail in her neck in her office here yesterday.

Dr. Bevier disappeared from his home last Friday night, telling his wife he had some trouble with a patient and had to go away. Mrs. Bevier had been unable to locate him since.

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## NEEDS REVISION

One of the simple things the approaching session of the legislature might well do is to definitely fix the number of representatives each county is entitled to, the same as has been done in the case of the state senate where each county is given a representation of one.

As the situation now exists, the size of the house is indeterminate, varying according to the vote cast for governor at the election 26 months previous.

For instance: in 1930 the vote in this county was smaller than average, which resulted in the county being entitled to but three legislators in the next session. In the 1931 session, this county had four representatives. In November a large number of voters happened to turn out, with the result that, according to the present law, the county will be entitled to five representatives in 1935.

Something here is all wrong. Why should a county's representation be determinable by the number of voters? Why not let the figure be based on population, or some other arbitrary reason? There is nothing to be gained by constantly shifting the number. Certainly, if this county is entitled to five representatives in the 1935 session, it should be entitled to five in the 1933 session, instead of three.

The result of the present arrangement is to cause endless confusion, and, as the result of the last election, to increase the house membership two years hence by about 20 members with the consequent increase in expense through additional salaries, mileage and otherwise.

This is just one of the many instances where the members of the approaching session can accomplish much by passing a few laws to repeal archaic ones. The present law regarding legislative representation is among those which should be rectified.

## JUVENILE SUICIDE

The suicide of a child ought to be the rarest of all tragedies. Unfortunately, however, it isn't. Newspapers quite frequently carry stories telling how some youngster who hasn't even entered his teens has killed himself; and usually, in the last paragraph, it is explained that nervous strain caused by overstudy was responsible for the act.

Here, it seems to us, is something for the directors of our educational systems to think about very seriously.

A child who has reached the age of 11 or 12 is, of course, capable of maintaining a fairly stiff pace in its school work. Nevertheless, it is quite possible to ask such a child to do too much; and the comparative frequency with which we get these reports of juvenile suicides due to overstudy seems to indicate that the strain which is put upon our youngsters is often a good deal too severe for them.

## BETTER LATE THAN NEVER

Complete freedom for the Filipino seems to be nearer today than at any time since the close of the Spanish-American war. Argument about the exact form which the independence measure is to take is by no means over, but it is pretty obvious that a definite agreement to turn the islanders loose in a specified time will be forthcoming at Washington in the very near future.

It would be nice if we could record the fact that the United States at last got a prickly conscience about its 30-year-old pledge to make Philippine independence an established fact. Unluckily, we can't. The price of sugar seems to have been the most important factor. Instead of a conscience, we have developed pangs in the pocketbook.

Nevertheless, the accomplishment is worth crowing about even if the motive isn't. Patriotic Americans are bound to rejoice that their nation is at last redeeming a solemn promise.

If we had our way there is another thing we would change. We would move the official opening day of winter about one month ahead and have it start Nov. 21 instead of Dec. 21. But we do not know just when to register our complaint!

We don't know whether to offer praise on the twentieth anniversary week of the transmission of the first radio voice or not.

One thing about the extreme cold of Dec. 12 and 13 is that it makes mere zero weather seem like Italian climate!
