WHOLESALE ARGUMENT

No disagreement can be had with the arguments of the public forum writer whose welcome contribution appears on another page of this issue.

But there is this to be added, especially regarding the purchase of home products: they should be given at least equal consideration with out-of-state or foreign goods. If they are as good or better, and cost no more or less, these facts should be constantly called to the attention of the public through announcements and advertisements.

No one seriously believes that because of an editorial pronouncement Idahoans will suddenly refuse outside commodities, or that because of a national slogan, foreign imports to this country will prevent going on the market.

Goods of all nations and all states will be constantly in demand, otherwise, as the letter-points-out, there would be a stagnation of commerce, which no one hopes for. But altogether too often, home-made goods are in disfavor for no other reason than that they are home-made, which is the basis for the present agitation to buy items of local manufacture where possible. Like most everything, carried to an intemperate degree the idea would be disastrous, but if the public reaction to these Buy movements is reasonable, there cannot help but be benefit to Idaho payrolls, more money in the pockets of her producers, savings made on freight and deserved encouragement to the establishment of local industry as a whole.

In other words, the movement, like many others, has the elements of selfishness, and like that trait is commendable so long as it is exercised discreetly and judiciously and continues to be founded on the theory of self-preservation and prudence; but to be condemned when carried to the extreme, to the detriment of the ends sought.

In effect, the whole idea harks back to the vaunted tariff policy of this country, which lately has come into disrepute.

Tariff walls, in effect, have for their purpose the prevention of importations and have tended to stifle world commerce by a policy of discouragement to world trade, the effects of which are only too well known to all of us. No argument can be gotten out of this newspaper on that score. Yet it is not contended that a reasonable tariff on some items would not be beneficial, or that a tariff for revenue only would be injurious. In other words there are limitations, where the policy ceases to be beneficial and becomes harmful, just as would be the case if the Buy Idaho or Buy America idea were overdone to the point of retaliation. One important difference between the two examples (Tariff and Buy Idaho) however, is that one is law and the other is dependent upon the free exercise of the public will.

In conclusion, it is well to point out that the balance of trade is against us—too much being shipped in and not enough being shipped out—illustrating quite conclusively that we here in Idaho have reason enough to do a little more of what our neighbors are apparently doing: buying local products and keeping more of their money at home. By continuing to maintain the quality of our principal products: potatoes, beans, beets, wheat and seed, we can sooner or later restore a favorable balance-of-trade to this section, which after all will be our only salvation.

Meanwhile we may Buy Idaho, in the knowledge that the implied selfishness is justified, for after all the Idaho manufactured products available are limited, and if not bought here will have to be shipped a long distance at great expense for someone else to purchase.

REPORTING VS. PROPAGANDA

The striking difference between newspaper practice in the United States and newspaper practice in most European countries was emphasized not long ago by William R. Castle, undersecretary of state, in a speech at Philadelphia.

When new developments in foreign relations occur at Washington, Mr. Castle pointed out, American newspapers naturally differ in their comment. Some support the government's policy, others condemn it. But all of them, no matter what their editorial policy tell their readers exactly what happened and tell it in a free, unbiased manner.

Overseas it is apt to be different. Outside of Great Britain, the press seldom tries to give a straight-forward and unprejudiced account of foreign news. Hunting for facts, the reader gets propaganda. Only rarely does he get a straight and uncolored story of what actually has happened.

This week has given opportunity for all those who must battle weather to prove their resourcefulness and fortitude, particularly mail men, newspaper carriers, highway snow-fighting crews, stage drivers, deliverymen, and many others. Lindbergh's first letter to the police said, "I am deeply grateful for the help and action you have taken in this matter.
