

FRENCH BUSINESS HALTED BY STRIKE

Proposed Wage Cuts Bring Protest from Workers In Various Lines.

PARIS, Feb. 20 (UPI) — Civil and municipal employees in Paris struck for a strike raising taxes to protest against proposed wage cuts. The mills, subways and tram lines, post office, telephones, the demonstration and technical delayed calling their classes to order.

Mail carriers were on half time throughout France.

Subways, buses, and street cars in many cities stopped abruptly for 10 minutes, and municipal employees in Paris and elsewhere left their places with their arms folded for an hour.

The postmen chose the hour of the heaviest mail delivery to adjourn to the nearest radio or bistro. Trams and subways stopped at an hour's notice, and those who happened to be teachers called off their classes to order half an hour later, usually during the noon recess.

The offices of the directors were closed on an hour's notice.

Most of the strikers began at 10 a.m., but the telephone and telegraph operators struck earlier, and their strike spread, in a spirit of surprise which added greatly to the general confusion.

TEN CENT MEALS SERVED STUDENTS

Food at Kansas University Will Be Nutritive but Inexpensive

LAWRENCE, Kan. (UPI) — In an effort to permit students, who might be forced to withdraw from the University of Kansas because of the University of Kansas funds amounted to a plan to serve meals to each student for 20 cents a day for 10 months or more, Chancellor E. H. Lindley announced the plan, which will be carried out under the "meal plan," and which will serve only students who show high achievement in studies, so that they really need assistance.

Breakfast, luncheons and dinner will be served each day except Sunday in the university cafeteria.

A sample menu, offered by Mrs. Mary Smith, director of the cafeteria, included:

Breakfast: Hot cereal, cream, bacon, eggs, ham, bacon, ham, sausages, noodles, cabbage, bread and butter, fruit or fruit salad, tea or coffee.

Vegetables, fruit or pudding, tea or coffee.

The menu will vary widely, according to the needs of the students.

Another plan is being worked out by the administration to help meet the financial difficulties of students in Lawrence in return for services. The people are co-operating with the administration and students said many contributed to the fund, which will permit starting the plan at the time.
