WASHINGTON, March 11 (UPI)—The Roosevelt economy program for balancing the budget through reductions in veterans' benefits and the salaries of federal employees was approved yesterday by the House, 265 to 135.

The Democratic majority, aided by Republicans, pushed the bill through the House, while most Democrats had threatened for time to emanate the measure.



**YOUR NEWSPAPER'S JOB**

No job in the world has been quite so exciting lately as that of the newspaper worker, unless it be the experiences of those in the inner circle of the government itself.

From the time of the Miami shooting, through the death of Walsh, the inauguration, the presidential proclamation, the lamented death of Cernak, the Japanese fracas, the Denver kidnapping, and the U. S. treasury news of stupendous importance, the demand in newspaper offices has been for steady nerves, a sense of values and broad judgment.

Contrary to a prevalent view, nothing has been held back from readers, and newspaper people are no more familiar with plans, programs, developments and prospects than are readers.

News events during the past two weeks have moved with lightning-like rapidity and the end is not yet. With Congress in session again; the national financial situation yet to be cleared up; and the economic complexity yet to be solved, big news is in the making.

Through it all the press-service people are put to all the stress and strain of the general public; they have no more financial or economic independence than the average person; they gasp as the teletypes reveal the death of Walsh, or the declaration of a national bank moratorium; their job is to evaluate the news, present it swiftly, accurately, comprehensively, and comment on it editorially, regardless of how devastating its implications may be.

The public is less interested and concerned, as is evidenced by the inquiries, the phone calls, the demand for newspapers, the unquenchable thirst for the latest developments.

Smattering broadcast by radio apparently are treated as gossip, for the majority of folk look to the newspaper to confirm the news before they accept it. And newspapers are in demand now more than they ever were before. Also their function takes on increased responsibility, for the public mind is in a formative stage, is groping for facts, guidance, ideas, opinion.

This newspaper prides itself in the part it is playing in this great development and in the service it is enabled-to-give its huge family of readers—it has high faith in the character of its constituents, as is evidenced by the manner in which they have adapted themselves to the unusual conditions. It has supreme confidence in the present trend toward a clearing in the economic skies and will continue to exert whatever influence it possesses in accomplishing this necessary task.

To know that all of us in this generation are actors in the great-human-drama-of-1933 is a thrilling experience, in which newspapers and their workers are doing their part in keeping the record straight and adding a daily page of history unprecedented in importance and human interest.
