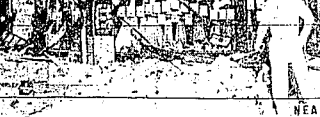

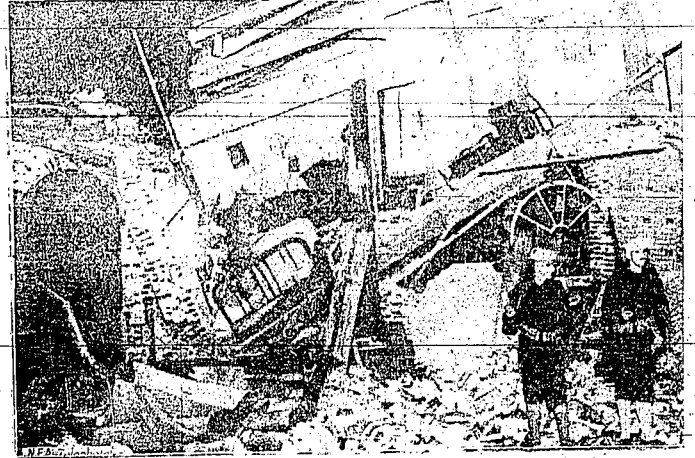

Climaxing a week of quick-moving events, the eyes and hearts of the nation were suddenly turned Friday and Saturday to California, where earthquake waves have impressed the indisputable fact that there are many things more important than dollars and cents—a subject upon which the nation centered its chief concern up to then.

Considering all the possible consequences of the disaster, and the fact that the number of dead was much less than first reported, the nation can feel itself fortunate that more damages and fatalities did not result. Only a small percentage of either the population or property was affected.

California will be quick to pull itself out of this set-back. There are plenty of idle hands to be put to work in the restoration processes; there is a large amount of insurance with which to start the ball rolling; and Californians with their supreme faith and confidence are among the last who could be damaged by a calamity such as that of last week.

The nation stands ready and willing to assist in the inevitable distress, just as it did on that other memorable occasion 27 years ago when fire and quake laid low the city by the Golden Gate. But there is no comparison in the two disasters; this one lacked in severity, for which all can be thankful. The country is confident that California will soon be able to erase the evidence of this later disaster quite as nobly, and as quickly and effectively as did San Francisco, and the nation will glory in the accomplishment.

COUNTRY TURNS TO PRESIDENT. No American president in all history has ever occupied quite the position that President Roosevelt occupies today.

By a unique combination of circumstances, he stands in the spot where all of the hopes and fears of the nation converge. The fears are greater than ever before and the hopes are more passionate. Every problem that the country faces—and there are many of them, overwhelming in size and complexity—has been dumped on his shoulders.

The responsibility that all of this puts on his shoulders is almost beyond belief. Because the nature and extent of that responsibility are widely realized, Mr. Roosevelt begins his term with the whole-hearted best wishes of all Americans, regardless of party. This is at once his strength and his weakness. If he succeeds he will be respected greatly; if he fails his failure will be immeasurable.

We have come to realize, in the hard years of the depression, that drift—no longer because drifting is taking us directly toward a catastrophe. We have also come to realize that the program which is to save us must come from the White House—because experience has shown us that it cannot possibly come from anywhere else. Today, as never before, we have placed our fortunes, our hopes for the future, our confidence in the American way of life, in the hands of our president. We have given him, so to speak, a blank check. From now on it is up to him.

There is something sobering, almost frightening, about it, but something which, at the same time, is vastly encouraging.

We have endured much since the fall of 1929; yet we have not given up our faith in those democratic institutions which have always been our pride. We have not set up a long record of bloody riots. We have not called out armed bodies to disperse our legislative assemblies. We have spoken our minds through the orderly processes of the ballot box, and today we are putting our problems in the hands of a man of our own choosing. The framework of our society has withstood a great strain. The rest depends—not on institutions, but on The Man.

HITLER'S VICTORY. The German election seems to have confirmed Chancellor Hitler's hold on power. Failing to get a majority of all the votes cast, the Nazi chieftain nevertheless won a substantial plurality, and this fact will undoubtedly be reflected in a new firmness on the part of his government.

What this will mean to the course of German history during the coming year is something that lies in the realm of guesswork. That it foreshadows a dictatorship seems fairly obvious; that German democracy has been dealt a body blow seems equally clear. But just what form this Fascist dictatorship will take, and just how its actions will affect the rest of Europe, are things that no man can say at this moment.

At all events, it is pretty certain that German history for the year 1933 is going to contain some highly interesting reading matter.

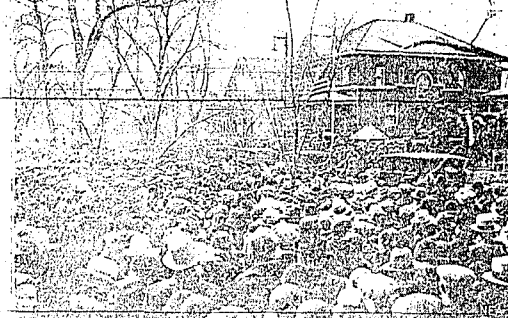
