SIMPSON REVEALS VIEWS

Senator McNary Would Limit Bill to Wheat and Cotton Crops

WASHINGTON, March 25 (UPI)—

Congress must grant "broad and flexible powers" to the administration if the farm problem is to be solved, Secretary of Agriculture Wallace testified before the Senate agriculture committee today.

McNary appeared before the committee to defend an incipient committee "front" which threatens to cut off his authority over agriculture by forcing him to act through the Roosevelt farm tenure bill.

Previously, John A. Simpson, president of the Farmers' Union, had said the program would not provide an administrative force to oversee agriculture.

Cost Cutted Henry

He estimated the cost of the federal government's farm programs at \$600,000,000 a year exclusive of lending payments.

His bill is absolutely impossible," said the farm organization leader as the committee opened its second day of hearings.

Two Jewelry Stores Entered Here This Morning In Identical Manner

Officers today are trying to analyze two fresh robberies which took place here during the past 24 hours. In both two jewelry stores were riddled of exactly the same goods, and by similar methods.

The victims were the Sterling Jewelry company at 118 Shoshone street, South, and Al. L. Roberts' Jewelers at 118 Main street North. Officer Thomas Russell reported one robbery at 3:37 a.m., and the other at 4:45 a.m.

Break-in Plate Glass

In each instance, the plate glass windows of the establishment were shattered and both plates, nothing more than two ladies' wrist watches were removed from display stands in the window.

Other goods including watches of greater value were passed up by the robbers, who apparently had learned enough in the windows to reach through and grab the desired articles.

The watches were the watches of women from a group of seven ones, while at the Roberts' establishment over two Hampton's men's watches to assure the pair of ladies' time pieces.

The total loss sustained in the strange raids amounted today at \$200, not the exact amount reported by owners of the buildings in the break-ins.

generally interpersed with open spaces, will give more satisfaction
than a row of trees, which are best
put in wherever there is room to plant them. The best of
all good planting is the open lawn.

"My idea of the development of
the tract would be to leave off and
then, if possible, to plant a few trees
between the rim rocks, more or less
though they are intended to be
left out. I think that the best plan
would be to approach it in
ground with this in mind. When
this is done, we can then take
into account the individual areas that are set
apart along the two or three miles
of the Whitefish Creek drainage.
At the same time, treatment should
be such as to allow a certain amount
of variety and interest to the place.
