Survivor Pens Vivid Account of Tragedy; Craft Is Demolished

HOUSE PROTECTS CODE MESSAGES

WASHINGTON, April 4 (UP)—The dramatic story of the crash of the dirigible Akron in the stormy darkness off the New Jersey coast early today, lifting into the water her officers and crew of 77 men of whom 74 are dead or still missing.

The mighty aerial craft, apparently a victim of lightning and a swift thunder storm, apparently came to rest in the water. A few hours after the Akron crashed, a great act of steel-plate wreckage and powerful engines floated slowly through the sea from Barnegat beach to Atlantic City, searching for survivors.

They found four men who lived through the collapse of the huge framework and entrance of the craft in which Rear Admiral William Moffett was one of the victims of a projected New England cruise.

One man was picked up by the first rescue boat from the dismasted German tanker Phoenicia, captained by Hubert W. Campbell, who had survived the crash of the U. S. S. Shenandoah in 1925. He died on the Phoenicia.

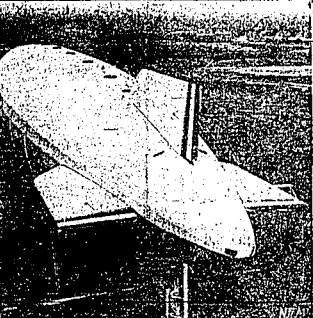

TRAVELING ALONG NEW PATHS

"The country needs and, unless I mistake its temper, the country demands bold, persistent experimentation. It is common sense to take a method and try it; if it fails, admit it frankly and try another. But above all, try something."

"This paragraph comes from President Roosevelt's own book, "Looking Forward," and it is a declaration of principles that is immensely encouraging. It seems to set forth precisely the attitude which a leader must have today.

We are not only struggling to climb out of a very deep depression. We have come, as far as we can tell, to the end of an era in our history. Whatever we are going to do in the future, it is going to be something new, something different.

The old ways have proven their inadequacy, and since we lack perfect wisdom, about the only thing we can do is go ahead by a trial and error method until we have found a new way that will work.

It is a long time since we have had a president who demanded "bold, persistent experimentation"; it is a long time since our own temper has been of a kind to support such a president even if we had had one. Ever since the war we have tried to play safe. "Don't rock the boat" has been our national slogan. We have asked our presidents to keep their hands off things and let well enough alone.

That worked all right, or seemed to, as long as things were indeed well enough. But when they went from bad to worse, and from worse to worst, it was a catastrophic policy. That we have at last discarded it, and have a president who has discarded it, is perhaps the most encouraging fact on the horizon.

No one knows just what is going to get us finally out of the depression. No one knows just how, having got out, we are going to keep from slipping back again. We can do nothing less than make some experiments. Some of them, in all probability, will not work, but that does not matter. Our only chance is to keep trying, over and over again, until we have found what we want.

NEW DEAL TO BRING MANY CHANGES

Even more interesting than the legislative measures now pending in Congress, in some ways, are the rumors of legislation to be asked in the near future. Washington seems to be full of these rumors. The capital, evidently, has decided that the present is a moment when anything at all can happen and anything will—some of the rumors are trial balloons, some are clever deductions, and some are outright guesses; but their cumulative effect is tremendous.

Thus we have our correspondent writing that Mr. Roosevelt's "little cabinet" has been working "brain trust" of professional advisers—is drawing up plans to have the government lease marginal coal lands and retire them from production, just as the pending farm bill would do with marginal farm lands.

Miss Frances Perkins, labor secretary, replies "I most certainly do," when asked by a senator if she favors the compulsory 30-hour week for industry—and leaves one wondering just how long it will be before Congress transforms this expression of opinion into law.

Simultaneously, it is reported that the administration's railroad plan, when finally put into shape, will call for something very much resembling outright government operation of the roads.

Add all of these things to the outstanding venture of the farm bill, to the reshaping of the nation's banking structure, to the government's implied determination to reduce such titanic figures, as J. P. Morgan, to the size of ordinary mortals, and it becomes clear that the administration is aiming at the most complex imaginable departure from traditional practices.

And in the face of all of this, it is rather impressive that we refuse to get excited by the prospect of radical changes. A new deal is, after all, a new deal. It ought to be plain to the blindest man that our old way of handling all of these things is no longer workable. We need, above all else, to be daring. If we are going to have great changes—well, let's have them, and more power to them.

The finest manifestation of civic responsibility displayed here in years is that which is being revealed today by the heavy voting at the city election. With such interest in evidence there is assurance that no one will be chosen by default, and furthermore, those who may emerge as winners in the contest will know they have been the choice of a considerable number of their fellow-townsmen and can carry their platform pledges into effect in the knowledge they represent a majority.
