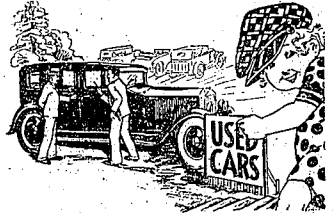

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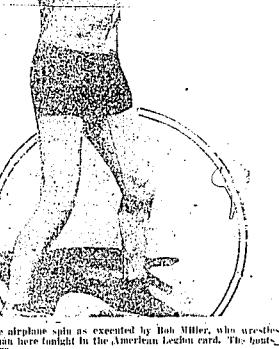

NEW YORK, April 12 (AP) - Stocks and commodities edged to lower levels in flat trading today, but values fluctuated irregularly in a narrow range.

Business news unavailable contained bullish. Steel operations jumped 3 points to 134 per cent; the inflation rate was stepped up 2 points to 18 per cent; Tom N. Girdler, chairman of Republic Steel corporation, forecast the start of a gradual increase in steel output.

Electricity output was off only a small amount for the week ended April 9 as compared with the last week of last year. A year-ago car-loadings of many leading roads were above the preceding week and the total of all roads, early figures indicated, showed a slight change from a week ago. Airlines' failures in March were the lowest in a year, according to the Bureau of Street Traffic.

Street traffic responded to the bullish business news, being generally more by technical conditions. The recent rally brought in selling for profit and the market failed to pick up because of outflows in MONEY.

It was reported in Boise Wednesday that a petition is being circulated in Boise, citizens of which hope to secure 5,000 signatures before presenting it to the governor.
