LEGAL NET TRAPS INDIAN BOXER AS MURDER SUSPECT

Jack Crim Held in Death of
Jimmy Walker and Edith
McLean in Oregon

UNDERGOES QUESTIONING

Body Suit of Clothes Furnishes Clue to Author-
ties of Northwest

POPLAND, Ore., April 23 (UPI)—A black man, arrested last night, was seized when police last night arrested Jack Crim, Indian boxer, as a suspect in the gang-style killing of Jimmy Walker and Edith McLean, Crim, ex-convent, and La Foy Johnson, who had been driving in his car, early drive address—but it was in Crim's room at another address—was found—also the bloodstained suit and clothing—the bloodstained clothing and personal effects of McLean.

The gunman held, in addition to clothing and other effects, a \$100 bill, which he said he had received from Mrs. McLean, who participated in a primary class. A wedding certificate revealed she was married to Edith McLean, and a man identified as Floyd McLean at Florence, Ore., November 3, 1917.

Indians (Actual)

The woman had been favored by the attentions of both Walker and McLean, and was shot twice after allegedly being hit and critically wounded by Walker. Police continue to search for the wounded Indians and are investigating the shooting of Walker and Mrs. McLean.

FAMOUS WOMEN ATTEND HEARING

Mrs. Roosevelt and Miss Mac-
Donald Hear Explanation
of Labor Measure

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UPI)—The participation of women in agriculture in the national recovery plan has been one of the most prominent topics of discussion in Congress during the past month.

"Arenaceous First Lady," Miss Isabel Macdonald, daughter of the British prime minister, was also very interested in practical agriculture.

Miss Macdonald, who is a member of the cabinet, explained to Mrs. Roosevelt to the hearing.

Novel Experience

It was Miss Macdonald's first experience with an American legislative body, and she was well received.

The presence of the two women had added significance in that Prime Minister Macdonald, like Mr. Roosevelt, is a labor minister in his first cabinet, in much the same position as Roosevelt, and a recent convert by the appointment of Miss Perkins.

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Receipts Swell Federal Coffers

Tax Payments Add Millions
To Treasury in March;
Figures Announced

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UPI)—Heavy income tax payments levied on the rich, the sale of gasohol, the automobile gasoline and sporting goods, and first return of federal excise tax collections to the government, all contributed to an increase in internal revenue collections in March.

Most of last night's conversations in the Senate were concerned with the new income tax.

Income receipts were \$176,253, against \$192,703,253 in March, 1932; \$22,572,647, against \$25,342,294 two years ago, while receipts from the sale of gasohol, gasoline, tax amounts to \$10,441,000.

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Senate Republicans Advise Silver Issue At Ratio of 33 to 1

RAIN DAMPENS ELECTION HERE

G. O. P. Seeks Bipart-
isan Endorsement
Of New Proposal.

WASHINGTON, April 23 (UPI)—The Senate Republicans are supporting a bill in the Senate today that would increase the ratio of silver to gold to 33 to 1.

Senators from both parties are supporting the bill, authorizing President Roosevelt to negotiate a new ratio of 33 to 1.

Interest in the bill is manifested by the fact that it would affect the value of the dollar.

Early Vote Desired.

Up to 1 p.m. little more than 100 senators had voted, out of 100, on the proposal, which is to increase the ratio of silver to gold.
