

RUSSIAN DECREE FIXES ZONES FOR TOLLING MASSES... Buffer Strips Are Established Along Western and Western Frontiers... THREE CHIEF REGIONS New Policy Unparalleled in History; Passport System Extended

MOSCOW, April 29 (UP)—The Soviet government passed a non-committal decree today establishing fixed zones for the population of 20,000,000 citizens and setting up buffer strips along both the eastern and western frontiers to be made up exclusively of politically and socially "reliable" citizens of the people.

The decree divided Russia into three main areas. The first will be the highly restricted zone from which "hostile classes and elements will be expelled."

Includes large areas of Moscow, Leningrad, Khar'kov, several of the Soviet union. It covers that area of industrial centers, and the 100 kilometer zone along the western frontier.

In this zone alone, the decree involved the removal of 15 million persons.

The decree contained the passport system, already applied to some of the larger cities of the Soviet union. It provides that the aim of the passport system was not only to demobilize the masses but also to strengthen popular morale in the most important and especially strategic regions which would be especially vulnerable in case of a foreign invasion.

The new policy represented a mass movement out of the history of the country.
