Formal opening of the new Drive-In Market in the Falk building at the corner of Main avenue and Second streets is set for Friday and Saturday, according to announcement of the management today.

Workers have been busy putting the building and stocks in readiness for the opening event, which will mark the introduction of this marketing plan on an extensive scale by Twin Falls.

Complete Grocery Store. Complete grocery store will be housed in the main building, and a bakery, delicatessen and lunch counter, as well as a number of other departments, including a song shop, a news stand, and apparel counter, are engaged in cleaning and preparing and the other a made-to-measure suit representative.

The building is that which formerly housed the Falls store, and is 55 by 126 feet in dimension. Display windows on the front and the entire west side afford ample daylight, while a balcony in the rear of the building will accommodate office, headquarters and rest rooms.

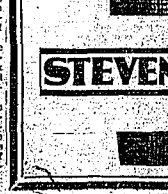
