

CHINESE FIGHT TO HALT DRIVE TOWARD PEIPING

Japanese Warn Chinese Town Will Fall Unless All Resistance Stops

HOSPITALS ABANDONED

Defenders Face Withering Fire In Determined Effort To Check Advance

PEIPING, May 12 (U.P.)—The Japanese war machine moved relentlessly toward Peiping today while a single Japanese infantry unit, a second in two days, swooped over the city dropping leaflets warning the populace that the fall of the city was imminent unless a resistance ceased.

Directors of a base hospital in Peiping were ordered today to prepare for evacuation southward. All wounded in the hospitals were being classified for transportation. Meanwhile, the arrival of new wounded soldiers from the battlefront overtaxed hospital facilities.

Fire at Plane

The Japanese military plane appeared at dawn. It was the first of a second day of aerial gunnery mounted on the city.

The Japanese army was only fifty miles north of Peiping, being determined to employ aerial subjects to withering artillery and aerial attacks.

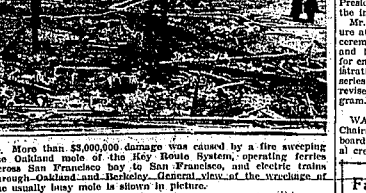
