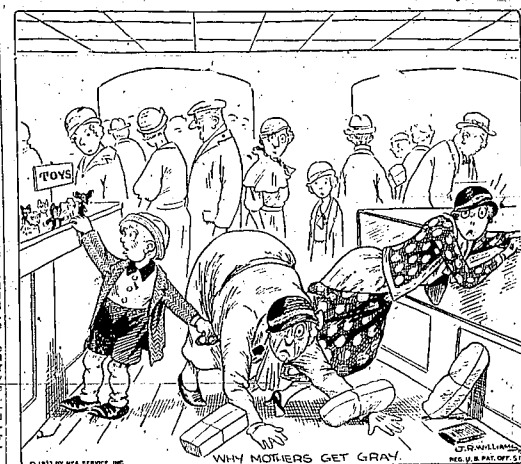

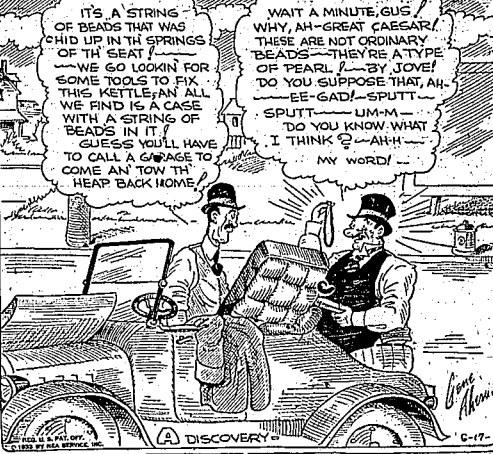

TWO EXPERIMENTS IN GOVERNMENT. One more nation seems to have decided that the right of the individual count for nothing in the highly-organized society of the industrial era.

Germany, whose government seems to represent exactly the man at the top, does precisely the same thing. Seeking widely divergent goals, these two nations have adopted almost identical vehicles.

Must we all follow either Germany or Russia? Must an industrial society, in the very nature of things, crush the last traces of individual freedom and choose between hard-boiled Communism or ruthless Fascism? Or is there, by good luck, a third road?

BACK TO THE FARM. A new trend in "buying for future profit" is accelerating the well established "back to the farm" movement in the northwest according to Ward K. Newcomb, head of the land department of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane.

OUR DEBT BURDEN. Figures on the national debt issued by the Twentieth Century Fund, which is headed by Edward A. Filene of Boston, show in a striking way the enormous burden which the nation is trying to carry out of the depression.

OUR DEBT BURDEN (continued). Long term indebtedness in the United States today, according to these figures, amounts to 40 per cent of the national wealth, requires 20 per cent of the national income and is one of the major obstacles to economic recovery.

MILLIONS SPENT ON PROPAGANDA

Nine European Nations Use Fortune in Extending 'Pet Theories'

By WALLACE CARROLL United States Staff Correspondent PARIS (UP)—Nine Soviet, British, and German governments have spent over \$2,000,000,000 this year on propaganda to put over their own theories and policies on the native populations and other nations. North and South America are the particular targets of these propaganda.

The French Government is authority for these figures, which show that Germany and Italy are the widest spenders for propaganda, with France and Britain as runners-up. These statistics are contained in the French Foreign Office 1935-1936 report to the Chamber of Deputies, just made public.

How They Spend The tabulation set out in this official document shows the following sums spent, directly and indirectly, for propaganda:

The French official report points out that the actual propaganda spending is in excess of those figures for almost every government has at the disposition of its Foreign Office "secret funds" of one million for which there is never any accounting. These totals do not include either the expenditures abroad of the British Intelligence Service.

The French report laments that France has fallen behind both Germany and Italy in the efficiency of its propaganda. It blames the report on the failure for the year of anti-French propaganda which swept across the United States after the French Parliament refused to pay the Dawes annuity on the war debts.

It says that France is leading in propaganda, according to this official report, the following figures:

Citing the cartoons of American newspapers, which bitterly pilloried French "pet" talks, broods, pledges, disrespect, resentment and "pet" as "debts," the movement of American women to refuse to buy French goods, the cancellation of ocean travel tickets on French steamers and the wave of anti-French talk, which swept the United States, the government document stresses the need for haste in propaganda.

Citing the example of Germany, which now has a Ministry for Propaganda, the Foreign Office report urges the creation of a French Council for Propaganda in France, to draft a definite program.

The Supreme Council would be composed of certain Professors of various French faculties, parliamentarians from the Chamber and Senate, committees on foreign affairs, finances and propaganda, experts from various French government departments. Their chief would become a member of the Cabinet as Under-Secretary for Propaganda attached to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

"It's really out of my question to keep pace with the rush of events. And Roosevelt must be possessed of a wonderful personality and physique. In addition his radio voice only adds to the whole strength of his character."

A typical mother was asked, "What do you think of Roosevelt?" "The outstanding characteristic of Roosevelt to me," she said, "is his manifest humanitarianism. His business, his success, his physical handicap, his culture, all appeal to me quite as much as his ability as an executive."

Turner K. Huchman, local attorney who carried on a personal correspondence with Mr. Roosevelt, previous to his occupancy of the White House, observed: "That man Roosevelt is quite a fellow. I became an ardent supporter of his during the campaign, wrote him some suggestions, and was amazed to receive a prompt personal answer. Since that time I've been equally prompt in replies to my letters which I cherish."

A Twin Falls business man, who bears widespread reputation for his conservatism and the value of his judgment, remarked: "Roosevelt has the country behind him for several reasons, chief of which, in my opinion, are his sincerity and his proved honesty. His motives are unquestioned, his idealism his reputation unimpaired, his confidence supreme."

"I believe all these things just as do the great mass of his fellow countrymen."

And added to all this, it's recalled that Will Rogers in the Evening Times Saturday said of the vote the American people gave Roosevelt last fall: "They thought Roosevelt was just another president, a remark that many readers consider fitting."

Roosevelt is said to have held the view previous to his election that the man who could lead his country out of the depression will become immortal.

Some think he will and some say he won't. A few interviewed here, however, are inclined to think that the President will make a mistake.

And that's the question.
