McLARRIN WINS IN FIRST ROUND

Takes Waterweight Crown by Knocking Out Young Corbett

LOS ANGELES, May 30 (U.P.)—Jimmy McLarrin, who has been known somewhat inconsistently as "The Belfast Spider" and "The Dublin Terror," today held the world waterweight title. He won it before 20,000 fans when he sent Young Corbett III, Fresno Italian, spinning in the second in the first round of their scheduled 10-round bout at Wrigley field.

Corbett went down first from a one-punch right hook to a second by a header left. He took a count of nine and came up only to be knocked out again by a series of lefts. He got to his feet once more but hit only once before going to the law.

Corbett out of Referee George Bink, manager of Pineda Barba, former boxer-champion, took a good look at Corbett and without hesitating to stop the fight, he raised McLarrin's hand in victory.

McLarrin, 25-year-old Irish man, took only two minutes and 37 seconds for his victory. The fight was a shock to the crowd, which made Corbett a hero of the night. The 20,000 were hardly settled in their seats when McLarrin was introduced to celebrate his victory.



Corbett started the bout in workmanlike manner. A southpaw, he was in a crouch, looking on a telling blow without a return. McLarrin, the former champion, took the fight and the dynamic in McLarrin's mitts was apparent.

They were almost in mid-fight when McLarrin landed first with his right and then with his left and Corbett, glassy-eyed, went to the floor. He got up once, watching Bink, and arose as Bink said nine. McLarrin, seeing the fall, went upon him. Three fast lefts and Corbett staggered. The crowd, which had been on its feet, went to the floor. He got up only to walk into a long looping left that sent him sprawling.

It was a cosmopolitan crowd, your banker from Detroit, your manufacturer from New York, your capitalist from the coast, joined with your garage-owner from Chicago.

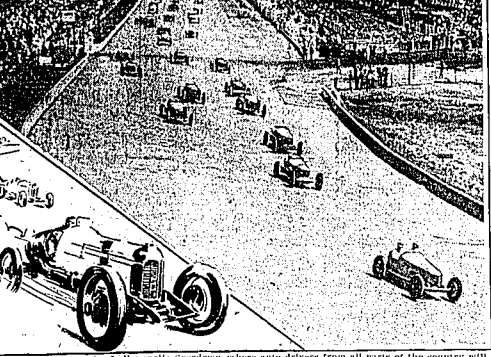

AS GLEANED FROM FILES OF THE TIMES

MEMORIAL DAY 1933

Memorial Day this year has a new meaning—not only for America, but for the world as well. In line with the beautiful custom of the years we strew flowers on the graves of our hero dead. With prayer and reverent tribute, our nation honors the memory of those who fell on its battlefields, from Lexington to the Argonne. It is fitting we do so.

But across the vista of these silent tombs today rises a vision of hope—for the children of today, for generations of the future. It is the hope that it will never be necessary, in an enlightened world, for the sacrifices of these men to be repeated.

We are, at last, on the highway that leads toward world peace. How far that highway is, that highway depends on how much the jealousies, suspicions and rivalries of nations can be crushed at the disarmament conference at Geneva. But at least we have made the start.

In his dramatic message to 54 nations on the eve of the Geneva disarmament conference, President Roosevelt extended his "New Deal" to the world. He pleaded for international understanding instead of resort to war, for a just and lasting peace in which the interests of the weak would be protected as well as those of the strong. Certainly, if the movement succeeds, history will accord him a place among her immortals.

There is nothing so futile as war. Victory is a hollow triumph, at best, for it leaves in its wake only misery and human suffering. Neither side can really win, both sides are sure to lose. As the Duke of Wellington once expressed it: "Nothing except a battle lost can be half so melancholy as a battle won." Nations are just beginning to realize that now.

MEMORIAL DAY 1933 (Continued)

Thus it may be, unless our hopes lead us astray, that with this Memorial Day a new era has dawned. In enlightened years to come this day may take on double significance; not only will it be a day for reverent tribute to our soldier dead, but also a day for offering thanks to God for the abolition of warfare which brought an end to such sacrifices of human life.

If these fallen heroes could speak from their tombs for the children of today and the children of tomorrow their voices would rise in unison in favor of such a plan.

MEMORIAL DAY 1933 (Continued)

Back of the difficulties which lie in the road of the disarmament conference at Geneva lies the simple fact that the ordinary citizen of the world does not know what he really wants.

Between mankind and the achievement of a fair degree of disarmament there are only intangible obstacles; such things as suspicion, prejudice and misunderstanding. And all of these, if you examine them, trace back to our inability to fix on a common goal.

On the surface, no such inability exists. Ask any man, in any land, what he wants his government to give him and he will reply that he wants prosperity, order, security, a chance to get and hold a decent job, make a decent living and bring up his children in conditions that will ensure the same things for them when they are grown.

It isn't hard to demonstrate that we don't really want those things at all; or, if we do, we take some extremely peculiar ways of going after what we want.

It is perfectly clear by this time, for instance, that no nation can truly "win" a prolonged war under modern conditions. The loser is doomed to certain revolution, chaos and long drawn-out misery; the victor has more than a fair chance of getting all of those things, and even if he misses them he is bound to get unemployment, recurring tides of deflation and inflation, economic distress and political disturbance.

You can hardly find a man who will not admit the truth of that statement. And if that statement is true, it follows inescapably that war is the surest of all ways for the ordinary man to lose all of those things that he most desires.

Yet we refuse to take the definite steps which will remove the danger of war. We admit that these things may be true, but we insist that we must have large armies and navies so that if war does come we can be the victors. Since all of us—Americans, British, French, Germans and Japanese—feel the same way, we go whirling merrily along toward new wars and the destruction of our fondest hopes.

If we really want the things that we say we want, we shall make a complete success of the disarmament conference. The trouble is that we aren't as desirous of those things as we think we are.
