South central Idaho was air-minded today as a nearby welcome was extended; the greatest armada of planes over the Idaho hills in twenty-five years was seen today. A total of nearly 2,000 was on hand at the airport between 10:30 and 11:30 a. m. to see the three army squadrons from Oregon to Salt Lake City.

Part of a third squadron got in at mid-air action. These included three bombers.

Assembled at the airport were some 200 automobiles. Traffic and guard duty was in charge of Co. 1511, 1st Cavalry, command of Capt. R. B. Leighton.

First Squadron

First to arrive shortly after 10 o'clock in the morning was a squadron of six pursuit planes and one transport plane to command of Lt. Col. G. M. Jones from Paducah, Ore., en route to Langley field, Va., from air maneuvers at Seattle.

Each plane was manned by two pilots. The pursuit planes were seven mechanics one for each pilot. The pursuit planes remained at the airport for an hour, taking off in formation for Salt Lake City.

JOHNSTON-ASKS NOTE ON REPEAL

Mayor to Present Resolution in Council Urging Boss To Set Date

Mayor Duncan McD. Johnston today declared his intention of introducing a resolution in city council meeting tonight, calling upon Gen. C. H. Ross to forthwith fix the date for a constitutional convention for the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment.

This step is proposed, the mayor said this afternoon, for moral and financial reasons, and in recognition of the situation in which so-called "border towns" as Twin Falls now find themselves.

The action is believed to be an outgrowth of the rapid development of the situation existing from the decision of Governor Hoos to call a special session of the legislature to set on legislation of beer, and the determination of the city council of Idaho Falls, another "border town" to legalize by ordinance, sale of 22 brew in that city.

Johnston's resolution says that "we recognize that the wishes of a majority of our citizens, under our form of government, should be respected and that the legal manager of determining this particular matter is by vote under the provisions set forth by the legislature."

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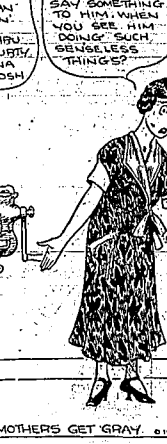
