Washington, June 6 (AP)—Those who will administer the industrial recovery bill drafted Wednesday today that they seek to establish a dictatorship over industry.

The administration's first and chief objection to the recovery legislation, as authoritatively explained, is to put men and women back to work and to revive the bill's power.

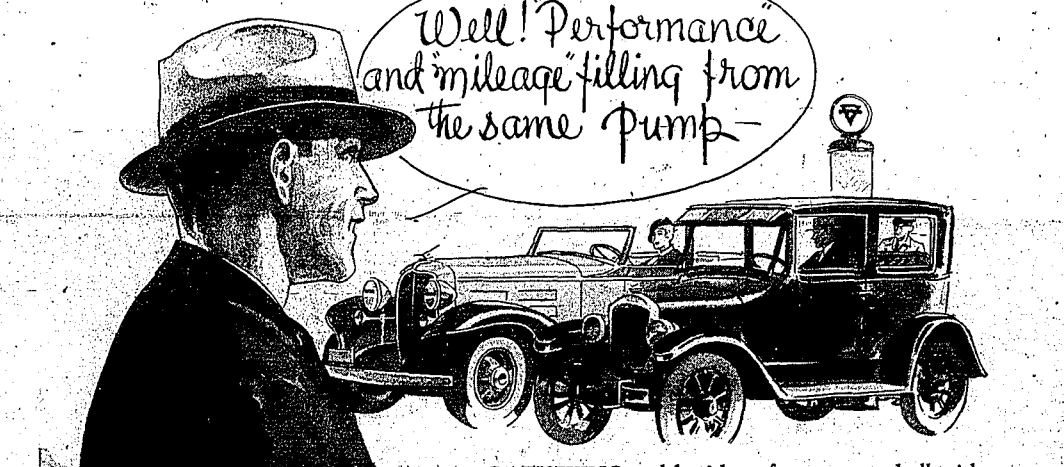

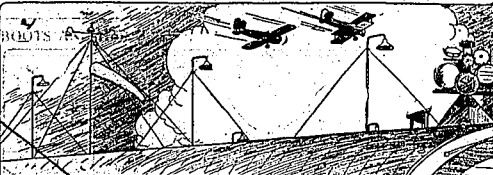

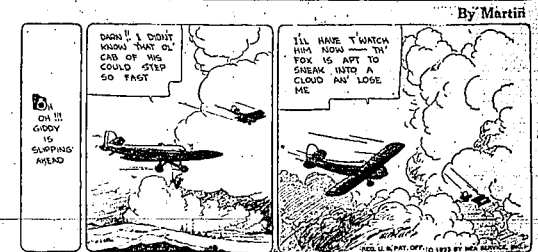
