U. S. DELEGATES REACH ENGLAND; BAR ARMS, DEBT

Secretary of State Declares Americans Will Confer On Economics

AIM AT TARIFF, TRADE War Payments Up to Washington

PLYMOUTH, England, June 8 (AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull, arriving today en route to the world economic conference, declared that war debts will not be discussed at the special treaty for London with the remainder of the United States delegation to the conference. Hull told the press he favored lowering excessive war debt payments to 25 percent below national debt, but that war debts talks are barred.

That subject is altogether outside the purpose of the conference, he said. "I have nothing to say regarding payment by Britain of the debt installment due next Thursday. That question will be handled separately by government officials at Washington. I cannot emphasize that too strongly. It is confined to our instructions for the economic conference."

He also said disarmament would be excluded from their mission, being left entirely to Britain, Davis and officials in Washington. There is a feeling of hopefulness in the United States regarding the issue of the conference. Hull's address, especially after a week of preliminary conversations between officials of Great Britain and the United States, has been hailed as a landmark. The nations have entered a new stage in their relations since the war. The economic barriers must be removed. It is hoped that the ultimate issue of the conference.

BRITONS DECIDE ON LAST MINUTE DEBTS PAYMENT

Cabinet Believed Prepared to Suggest Settlement on Silver Basis

LONDON, June 8 (AP)—The cabinet Friday will approve a last minute vote to the United States for the settlement of the war debt payment due June 15, it was learned officially today.

It was believed the cabinet proposal would suggest meeting the payment with 15 million pounds (\$40,140,000) at today's opening quotation in silver.

Officials were obviously optimistic that the cabinet would have taken no action concerning the debt payment. The cabinet was represented as being reconciled to the necessity of making a decisive move.

It was said officially that no announcement of the cabinet verdict would be made until the proposal had been conveyed to Washington.

World Mean Saying if permitted to pay in silver, Great Britain would effect a large reduction. The amount due is \$10,000,000.

It was considered possible that Secretary of State Cordell Hull, who arrives today with the cabinet delegation, would confer with British officials before the cabinet meeting.

Court Order for New York Financier Ends After "Worst Day"

ADMISSIONS TO A MING BAZAR Tried for Income Tax Evasion Amounting to \$80,000

NEW YORK, June 8 (AP)—Charles E. Mitchell's court order ended today after he paid income tax charges after three and a half years and failed to report in his financial statements by which he was enabled to swear off \$80,000 in income taxes for 1927 and 1928.

The former head of the National City bank's great network of affiliates, was accused shortly after he had been subjected to cross-examination by S. Attorney George Z. Medaris.

"Worst Day" Mitchell's "worst day" from the standpoint of the defense came today, when Medaris won admissions that the government considers highly important to its case.

Among the high points of his concluding testimony were: 1. He admitted that the \$600,000 he drew from the National City company's management fund in 1927 and 1928 was actually drawn from 1927 and 1928 tax return for that year had never been repaid, as "required" by resolution of the board of directors.

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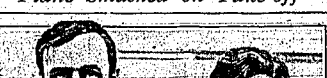
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Plane Smashed on Take-off

**Enthusiasm Shown For Junior League**

BOISE, June 8 (Special)—Shoebone's Junior League baseball team, sponsored by the Weeks-Yaeger Post, the American Legion, opened its 1938 season last week by playing a 4-4 tie against the game with the Shoebone town team. Friday evening in Gooding, Idaho, they played their first game of the year against Junior League competition, beating the Gooding team, sponsored by the American Legion, Post of Gooding, by a score of 24 to 4. **Britain Worries Over King George As Ruler Celebrates 68th Birthday**



LONDON—Great Britain's millions are concerned over the health of their ruler, King George VI, who was 68 years old on June 3. They are realizing that as a consequence of a bloody attack in the autumn of 1923 which almost cost his life, the king is getting prematurely old, and that he must carefully guard his health and conserve his strength.

The king remained away from London during an influenza epidemic there. Recently he was laid up with a bad cold but had meticulously recuperated to attend a communal vaudeville performance in a London theater May 22 and the opening of the royal military tournament May 23. He was prevented from attending the presentation of society debutantes at court by a bad attack of rheumatism.

Saving Strength  
The king is more anxious to be able to make the opening speech at the World Economic Conference which opens here June 15, which he considers the most important international gathering since the peace negotiations at Versailles.

Queen Mary's 68th birthday was celebrated on May 28. She is in excellent health. The king has few recreations, although he likes shooting and yachting. But he has kept so busy that he must parcel out his leisure time carefully. Ordinarily at Buckingham Palace his mornings from 8 o'clock onward are occupied by correspondence and audience.

After half an hour's rest after luncheon there is more work of the same sort unless some function requires the royal presence.
