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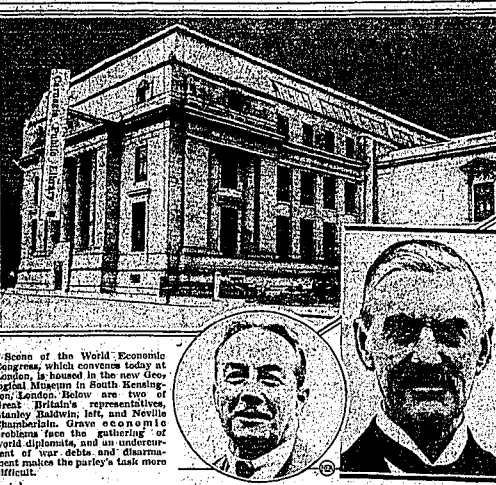
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Eyes of World on London Today

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KING GEORGE URGES NATIONS TO BURY ECONOMIC TRENDS AS WORLD CONFERENCE OPENS

Representatives of 66 Nations Convene in London to Eliminate Barriers in Path of Recovery

Plans for the economic revival of the world will be offered at the London conference were almost as numerous as delegates, in the major nations wish.

Stabilization—Stabilization of currencies, reduction of tariffs, increase in world commodity prices.

Great Britain—Settlement of war debts, elimination of currency barriers, reduction of trade barriers, increase in commodity prices.

France and Italy—Universal return to the gold standard, settlement of war debts.

Germany—Reduction of debt charges, universal return to the gold standard.

Japan—Outlawing of the economic boycott, elimination of the depreciation of the yen.

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Tusko, Elephant Who Got Himself Intoxicated, Dies

SEATTLE, Wash., June 12 (UP)—Tusko, the largest elephant in captivity, died today.

The charm that enabled him to resist scores of near fatal escape attempts in the Seattle zoo, the victim of indignation.

The House ways and means committee voted to delay consideration of the bill. The bill was not on the administration program.
