In the event the holder of a mortgage does not desire to accept the corporation bonds in exchange for his equity, the government organization is authorized to extend loans not exceeding one per cent of the value of the property.

The corporation is also authorized to redeem loans not in foreclosure within the past two years through substitution of its own funds.



CITY TO SHARE IN U. S. FUNDS

Bunting Explains Provisions Of Public Works Bill For Idaho

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 15 (Special)—Provisions of the Public Works bill, under which Twin Falls and other Idaho cities expect to secure certain grants of financial assistance for street construction was explained today by Earl Bunting, economic adviser for the state of Idaho, and personal representative of Gov. C. Ben Ross here.

The bill provides \$3,500,000,000 for a comprehensive program of public works under the direction of a federal engineering administration composed of a board of three directors appointed by the president.

Concerning the use of funds available for emergency construction of public highways and related projects in the form of aid grants to the several states.

"The law allows these funds to be employed on a wide variety of highway system and extensions into and through municipalities, which will make possible a complete linking up of main highways by the construction of standard roads with the best type of town and cities.

"There is no individual direct project, except on public works projects, employed on these executive or supervisory positions, will be permitted to work more than 30 hours in any one week. Inasmuch as it is contemplated that the bulk of work to be performed under jurisdiction of the new act will be upon construction awarded after competitive bidding, the maximum rate of wages to be paid by the contractor.

"Idaho, under the provisions of the Public Works bill will receive an allocation of \$5,010,000 as its share of the regular Federal-aid money and the additional \$1,000,000 for forest lands, national park roads and highways through public lands making a total of approximately \$7,010,000 to be immediately expended in the state on the public works program. FILMS URGED AS LAW STUDY AID

University of Oklahoma Has New Idea for Legal Training

NORMAN, Okla., (AP)—Law students would learn their profession by observing books and picture methods in form of motion pictures, under a new plan of instruction proposed by Floyd A. Wright, professor of law at the University of Oklahoma.

Killings, embarrasments, accidents, grounds for divorce and other potential tawdry material would be thrown before the students in plain sight. Each would be shown together with the facts from observation.

"Through the use of the film the students would be taken into the various courts . . . to witness the proceedings, trial arguments of counsel and other matters," wrote Wright in an article explaining his plan.

"It would hasten to judge upon points of evidence and how charge juries and pronounce decisions.

Cost of making the various films would be the only present obstacle to realization of the scheme. Wright believes the cost would not be prohibitive even now in some respects.
