PINE PLAINS, N. Y. (UP)—"Sedentary cowboys" ride the range in the hills and usually are found near the edge of the city. Scarcely out of ear-shot of Fifth Avenue's grunting motor-liners and sight of Wall Street's jangling lovers, a prize-winning herd of 1,400 steers grazed on the hill-bordered acre reminiscent of the West's great cattle ranches.

FOREIGN-ORANGE DEMANDS SPURT

In Excess of 200,000 Cases Exported in Single Week's Shipping

LOS ANGELES (UP)—More than 200,000 cases of Valencia oranges were shipped from Los Angeles harbor during a single week in May on a dozen vessels to Europe, the Orient, Canada and Australia. To the United Kingdom and Europe alone went 122,000 cases on six ships. The Dutch East India's mail liner Europa took off 25,000 cases and the British steamer Parthenia 20,000 cases. Similar shipments were on the motorships San Francisco, Pacific Transporter and Villager. The Italian liner Duchessa d'Acosta sailed for Marseilles with a pioneering shipment of 800 cases. Oranges destined for Manila and Hongkong via transshipment to the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Asia went north in refrigerated holds of the Gasec liner or Santa Lucia, carrying also in shipment for Victoria's commissary, 200 Vancouver 2020 cases were taken out on the Swedish motorship Annie Johnson. The Matson-Oceanic express liner Monterey took out a cargo of Valencias for Australia and New Zealand.

REPLY ON DEBTS DRAWN BY U. S.

Attention Officers on Talks for Revision of War Payments

WASHINGTON, June 16 (UP)—The state department today drafted replies to the explanations offered by France and other nations which defaulted yesterday on their debt payments to the United States. The exchange of notes between this country and France may be made public late today or tomorrow.

With settlement day passed, attention centered on forthcoming negotiations for revision of the war debts. Great Britain is expected to be the first to present its plan. Convivial talks with British envoys may begin next month. President Roosevelt is making no promise of retaliation, but will submit the debtors proposals to Congress at its next session.

Small Percentage More than \$14,000,000 was due to the United States yesterday. Of this the treasury collected just \$11,303,948.

Only one nation paid in full—Little Finland which owed an installment of \$148,200.

Small payments were made by Great Britain, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Rumania and Poland. Seven defaulted altogether in France, Belgium, Poland, Estonia, Hungary, Lithuania and Yugoslavia.

Most of those who paid did so in silver. The United States is expected to accept the United States at the Indian mint in Bombay. Britain is expected to send to the San Francisco mint as soon as possible.

JUDGE REFUSES BEER LICENSES

Federal Jurist Rules Kansas Must Satisfy Liquor Problem Itself

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 16 (UP)—Kansas must solve its own beer problem, a federal judge ruled today in a decision handed down by Judge A. J. Pollock of Federal court in denying the application for an injunction to restrain state officials from interfering with sale of 3.2 beer.

He put the responsibility for control of beer production and sale on the state. Judge Pollock's ruling was on the injunction application of the Federal Mercantile company of Wichita.

Anticipating a favorable ruling, some 600 persons had obtained permits to sell 3.2 beer in the state. Federal revenue officials said they could get refunds on the worthless certificates.

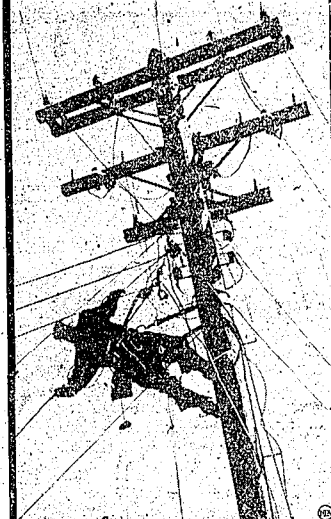

Doctors Hear Prolonged Tobacco Use Hurts Eyes

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 16 (UP)—Final sessions of the American Medical association's 84th annual convention were here today, winding up a five day study of the battle against disease by the nation's leading physicians.

Prolonged use of tobacco and make close work of the eyes impossible, Dr. Arthur Yudin, of Yale university, told the physicians. Cod liver oil and vitamin A concentrate are effective as remedies, Dr. Yudin said.

In the concluding section of the meeting today, Dr. Lyle Hunt, of the John McCormick Institute for Infectious Diseases, Chicago, described new discoveries in treatment of scarlet fever. The disease, Dr. Hunt reported, is much less severe and complications are less likely to develop scarlet fever antitoxin is given within the first two days after illness appears.

WASHINGTON (UP)—As the United States enters the third year of the third decade of the electrical era, revolutionary plans are being made to electrify every corner of the continent.

First in the public eye is Muscle Shoals. There the government will soon launch its first superpower system, generating perhaps a million horsepower or a more by hydroelectric power in a grandiose scheme for unified social and industrial development of practically the whole southeastern corner of the continent.

Taxpayers' money for the mammoth international navigation and power project for the St. Lawrence area in the northwestern United States, an agreement with Canada, makes the Great Lakes and Atlantic rivers a uniting horsepower to divide between the United States and Canada.

And for the northwest the ultimate in hydroelectric power is being planned, including several dams on the Columbia river to bring out part of the \$4,000,000 horsepower now being harnessed to the Pacific.

At this time it takes a little matter of \$2,000,000 of government taxpayers' money. Much of the money is spent on the government from sale of power and other means if it should ever be used for the present it is using taxpayers' money on a grand scale.

It is because the government is so large that it can afford to spend so much on these projects as more than most electrical units. That is the revolutionary part of the era, and it is being brought about by the government, but largely by a by-product.

Getting Money Back Each of these four projects has the important characteristic of power production, aims at private enterprise and is to be completed in the near future.

GERMAN CREDITS AGREEMENT MADE

Foreign Investors Sign New Document on Private Investments

LONDON, June 16 (UP)—American and other smart term credit of Germany made large new loans today in signing a new standard agreement.

Faced with an exchange moratorium declared by the rubber bank, which becomes effective July 1, American, Dutch, Swiss, British, French and Scandinavian lenders agreed to reschedule their foreign repayment of capital in foreign currencies on approximately 80,000,000 marks (approximately \$2,700,000) that will fall due before the standard agreement expires in February, 1934.

The creditors have approximately 2,000,000,000 marks (approximately \$67,000,000) in short term investments frozen in Germany.

The creditors were given the option of receiving their capital payments in the form of registered marks which are currency that can only be redeemed in Germany. Acceptance of registered marks would imply a waiver of foreign currency, and it was expected that many creditors would refrain from drawing these capital repayments.

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GERMANY SEEKS STABILIZATION

Currencies Will Form Central Aim of Nazi Delegates to Conference

BERLIN (AP)—Restoration of normal currency conditions is one of the aims of the World Economic Conference which opens at London today. The German government is preoccupied with the currency problem, because the depreciation of the mark has done much to damage German export trade, and because Germany's own currency system needs readjustment.

German exporters are encountering growing difficulties in the foreign market in view of the fluctuation of British and American currencies. The result has been the favorable trade balance between 1921 and 1927 from 287 to 57 million marks yearly, in contrast to Britain's abandonment of the gold standard.

Germany's export trade is feared as a consequence of the dollar depreciation.

One defense Germany made against a gesture to defend herself against "currency dumping" she introduced a series of laws applicable to imports from countries with depreciated currencies. This measure, however, proved only to defend German producers against competition by currency dumping on the German market, while it afforded no help for German exporters.

Many believe that the lowering of the mark's exchange value in the future under present conditions, had concerned international relations for the reason that such a policy is held preferable to cut-throat currency competition.

As long as no such international agreement is forthcoming, Germany seems to favor a policy to preserve the gold standard. This does not mean, however, that Germany at present has a genuine gold currency.

Not Antislavery That is to say, the German currency does not automatically maintain itself on the market. The mechanism of gold movements, which is attainable by countries feeling all currency transactions to strict state control.

German financial leaders favor the return to genuine gold currency. President Hindenburg of the Reichstag declared that it is his aim to replenish the mark's gold supplies so that gold might again become the backbone of the German currency.

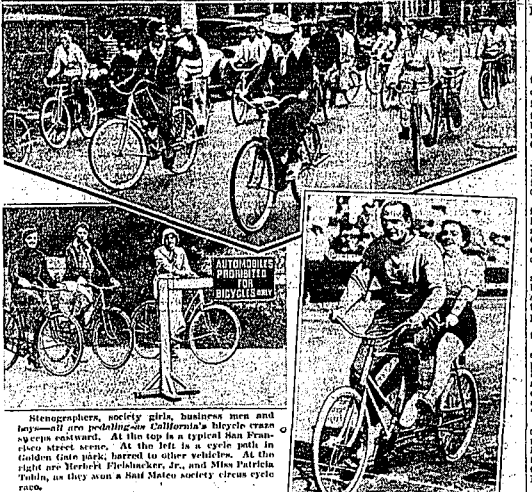
New Mineral Field Being Exploited

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—When the U. S. Frigate Constitution comes to Portland this summer on its round-the-nation tour one of the most interested visitors on board will be Mrs. Amelia C. Johnson, 89, a resident of Forest Grove.

Mrs. Johnson's father, William Johnson, was a sailor on board the historic ship when it made American naval history by defeating the British ship "Guerrriere."

Johnson for a time was a sailor in the British navy. He deserted in Boston, but later returned to the U. S., enlisting as a sailor on the Constitution in 1812. He fought against the countrymen in the war of 1812.

Johnson was the Quartermaster and the Constitution's quartermaster for their epic battle. Capt. Hull of the American ship called to the ex-British sailor that he need not join the boarding party.

Johnson nevertheless prepared to board the British vessel.

Remembering the downward sweep of the English cutlasses, he placed two pieces of iron barrel hoop inside his cap. That move saved his hair, but a slanting blow crashed on his head, inflicting a deep wound. In spite of the iron "helmet."

After the war he came west with a Hudson Bay expedition and married an Indian girl in the Grand Fondo valley of Oregon. At one time he was high sheriff of the Oregon territory, extending from Montana to northern California.

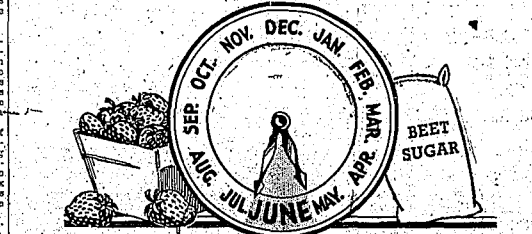

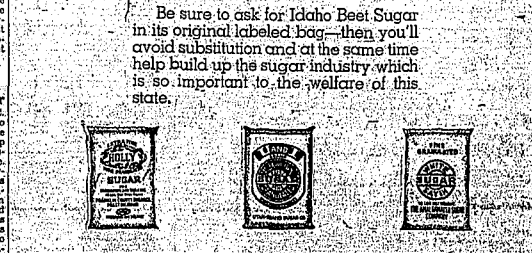

OUTPUT HIGHER AT MILK CO-OP

Improvements Increase Dairy Producing at Jerome, Creamery

"Installation of new vats and presses in the plant of the Jerome Cooperative Creamery has permitted a 50 per cent increase in production, according to O. T. Koster, manager.

Work of installing the new machinery and equipment was completed in time to permit manufacturing under the speed-up schedule Monday of this week, he says, providing for the production of 2500 pounds of Challenge cheese daily.

Sixty per cent of the product is marketed locally, while the remainder is shipped to California. The creamery ships two mixed cars of produce to the coast weekly, the contents including Challenge cheese and butter and dressed poultry.

More Employees

To care for the increased demand for cheese and dairy products, the 24th person was added to the crew of the local plant yesterday, Koster said today. This is an increase of the crew from 11 earlier in the year, when the daily cheese production averaged 7500 pounds.

In addition to cheese, the local plant produces Challenge Ice cream, artificial ice and performs the first process in the production of cashew. The latter product is shipped from Jerome, Idaho, where the drying plant is located. Cream is forwarded to Jerome where the association manufactures all its butter.

All the cheese produced by the Jerome Cooperative Creamery organization which operates throughout southern Idaho, is made here. It is of the American or cheddar variety, and is sold in three sizes, triple and single longhorns.

Some idea of the scope of the operations carried on at the local plant is seen in the casual remarks of Mr. Koster, who is now being received at the creamery here 65,000 pounds of milk daily.

"Do you mean more than 30 tons of milk every day?" the reporter inquired.

"I mean thirty and one half tons a day" he emphasized.

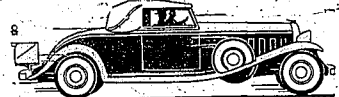

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SEA FURNISHES MAGNESIA MILK

San Francisco Chemical Company Puts Operations on Money Making Basis

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The waters of the Pacific Ocean now provide milk for science as well as salt.

Changing sea water into milk of magnesia in the modern, miracle being performed on a commercial basis by the San Francisco chemical company. Nowhere else in the world is milk of magnesia recovered from sea water, according to R. Clark, president of the concern.

Clark explained that other manufacturers begin with either magnesium rock or epsom salts and caustic soda to produce magnesium milk products.

With water from the Pacific Ocean as a base, the company produces milk of magnesia which conforms with all requirements of the U. S. Pharmaceutical Board. The firm's unique process requires 100,000 gallons of sea water daily.

The water is pumped into huge tanks, where calcium has been removed. The reaction forms milk of magnesia. At this section, it is drawn out of the bottom of the tank and the used water is returned to the ocean. Next, all salts not included in the milk of magnesia formula, including calcium, sodium, iron, lime and iodine, are removed from the solution so that it conforms to the pharmaceutical formula. Then it is ready for bottling and marketing.

State School Farm Has \$12,000 Profit

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)—A \$12,000 profit for the fiscal year 1932-33 has been reported by the state industrial school farm, an outfit by State Accountant William H. Hays.

The report was in sharp contrast with that for practically all other state public institutions in the same period.

Production values and crops sold were placed at \$20,229, while production costs amounted to \$7,133.82. Nearly all vegetables used at the school were produced on the farm and no seed has been purchased at the institution in nearly three years.

Improvements In Lumbering Visioned

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)—Definite improvements in lumbering are being manufactured in the lumber industry throughout the northwest, Prof. J. H. Reinitzer of the University of Montana forestry department reported after a 4,000 mile trip through Oregon, Idaho, Washington, California and Nevada.

Reinitzer, with Prof. Roy C. Clark, made the trip with nineteen other students of the forestry department.

Logging camps and mills visited where there were no "going full blast," Reinitzer said. He attributed the pick-up to depletion of lumber stocks, and a renewed demand for building material and other lumber supplies.

'Chain Store' Fees Effective July 1

HELENA, Mont. (AP)—Effective July 1 every wholesale and retail store dealing in commodities in Montana will be required to pay fees established in a "chain store" bill passed by the last session of the state legislature.

The measure applies to single stores as well as those which are members of a chain. Even local stores selling blue Polish and shoe strings come under its provisions. License fees range from \$2.50 to \$30 per year. The measure is expected to provide \$15,000 to \$20,000 for the first half of its operation.
