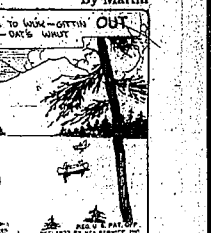

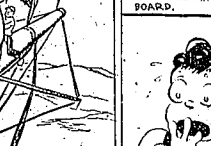

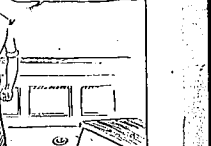

MONSTERS BUILD FOR WORLD FAIR

Bartram Couldn't Have Dreamed of Huge Beasts Built for Chicago

By NEA Service

NEW YORK—From a rambling old building on the west side of Manhattan, these days and nights, some artists had roars mingled with heavy blows and the tortuous whining of saws. Inside, men are busy with huge forms of all shapes and dimensions.

It's the house of monsters—the lair of the saber-tooth tiger, the den of the dinosaur, the cave of the playboy-bled. A mammoth, seven feet high, built by a sculptor in his crowded quarters. A giant gorilla, roars menacingly at a girl who comes near. An above-ground elephant trumpets his wrath.

F. P. Bartram, a sculptor, has dreamed of them. H. C. Wells has only the vaguest idea of them. Not even Wells, sculptor of the never-over anything like them. Not even George Mesmore and Joseph Damon, an architect and a former stage-hand, have brought their terrific ideas to life.

Seven Million Years

Meannors and Damon, materialists of nightmare, animators of unworldly, are about to lead a cavalcade of prehistoric to Chicago and the Century of Progress Exposition. There, in a special headquarters building, "The World a Million Years Ago," they'll stable their awe-inspiring prehistoric and walk hand-in-hand whether the gate receipts will justify their half-million-dollar investment.

The partners are nothing new. They've been together for years and other dawg-eared creatures attending an ultra-modern fair. They'll tell you that nothing is new in modern that the powered engine and automobile and the electric device with which these things are endowed. "A more modern" says Mr. Mesmore. "We're going to show them Ten Thousand Years of Progress."

Stalk in Terrifying

B of L. E. Empire Topples Into Ruins As Courts Rake Leaders of Enterprise

CLEVELAND (AP)—Concluding chapters are being written on the organized-labor's first and greatest venture into the realm of capitalism.

"The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, at one time the richest and most powerful labor organization in the country, made the experiment on a grand scale."

Today, all that is left of the financial empire which grew from that first attempt is a burden of debt and millions in losses. And recently a grand jury in Cleveland returned indictments against three officers of the closed Standard Trust Co., the only remaining unit in its maze of financial organizations.

Three Indicted

The three men indicted were Alvin Johnston, grand chief engineer of the Brotherhood, and former director and chairman of the executive committee of the bank; H. C. Caspell, general secretary; and J. H. Smith, bank's former president. All were charged with false entry and manipulation of the bank's funds. The grand jury meantime is continuing an investigation of the bank's affairs.

The indictments were handed down while the Brotherhood was in convulsion here. An active movement for unseating Johnston and his administration had been in progress, but the convention voted to suspend Johnston from office and asked suspension of judgment until present proceedings were concluded.

Stone Firm Chief

Warren S. Stone, who had become outstanding labor leader in the 17 years he had headed the Brotherhood, was chief advocate of that first bank which opened in 1920, under the name of the Locomotive Engineers' Co-operative Bank. MOSCOW EXPECTS PARLEY TO FAIL

Soviet Political Circles See No Success at London Conference

MOSCOW (AP)—Failure of the World Economic Conference to reach the Soviet's political aims is expected here.

"The conference will not be a success," said a Soviet official. "The Soviet Union will not be a party to the conference."

Like every other nation, the Soviet Union will watch the proceedings of the conference with a view to safeguarding its own interests. The conviction is openly voiced that the conference will not hesitate, wherever possible, to make the Soviet Union the scapegoat.

Of the contradictions between non-Soviet nations, in Moscow's opinion, the most serious is that between Great Britain and the United States. Economic warfare between the two great English-speaking nations will have political rivalry as the inevitable concomitant, will be the outstanding factor in the philosophy of Soviet observers here.

Moreover, far from ending the war, the conference will tend to make the conflict sharper. Such is the gist of the Soviet view.
