WEST VIRGINIA AND CALIFORNIA APPROVE REPEAL

New Victories Bring Number of Ratifications to Sixteen

DOUBTFUL STATE TURNS

San Francisco Legislators Wet Majority of More Than Sixteen to One

Sixteen states of the 36 necessary have approved repeal of the 18th amendment. California and West Virginia added their votes in decisive action yesterday.

The California vote gave West Virginia a majority to exceed three to one. Traditionally dry Los Angeles gave its vote to repeal. San Francisco was wet 16 to 1.

In West Virginia, the polls opened, the vote majority was expected to approximate two to one.

So far each state where elections have been held, has approved repeal. The count to date: New York, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Illinois, Ohio, Nevada, Delaware, Wyoming, Missouri, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Iowa, West Virginia, and California.

TWO TO ONE

NORTHERN IDAHO FIRES INCREASE

Forests May Be Opened Only By Permit Unless Careless Campers Reform

MISOULA, Mont., June 28 (UP)—The forest service in Montana and northern Idaho may be opened to travelers only by special permit to non-campers, officials here today announced. Plans to mount a number of regional camps, Evan W. Kelley, warden today.

In the last 16-day report of regional campers, 100 campers and men were shown as the worst offenders in starting fires, 100 being charged with carelessness. If campers, hikers and travelers believe in the forest, it is unnecessary to enforce the added restriction, Kelley said.

Repeal of the 18th amendment today was the subject of a hearing before the board.

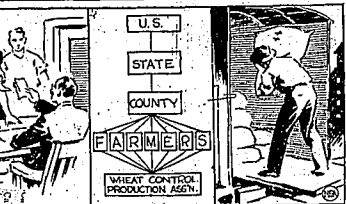
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How U. S. Will Help Wheat Farmer



Wheat farmers are organizing to reduce their 1934 and 1935 production up to 20 per cent with benefit from the \$150,000,000 the government will spend to raise the price of wheat to the 1929-30 level. This would mean payment of probably 3 cents a bushel on the number of bushels by which a farmer reduced his production below the three-year average. The amount of 1934 reduction will be on the order of 10 per cent. The London international conference on wheat, Sept. 15, probably \$100,000,000 will be distributed among farmers who comply with the government's plan.

Each state will be allotted the number of bushels of wheat which represent its share of consumption over the base period. The plan will be made on the same basis. It will be made by the county wheat control production association, formed by farmers agreeing not to produce more than the 1923 output. Farmers will be without a director whose salary and expenses will be without from the pro rata payments.

USUAL TREND REVERSED

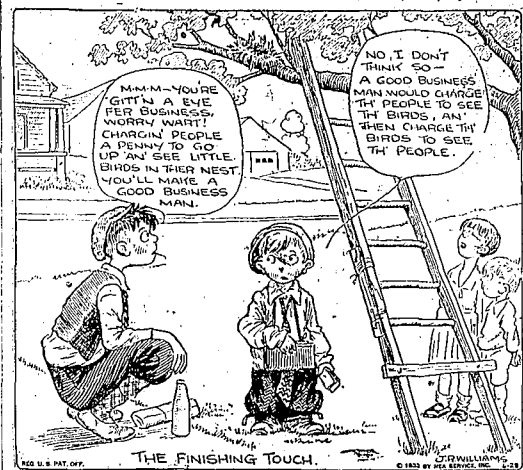

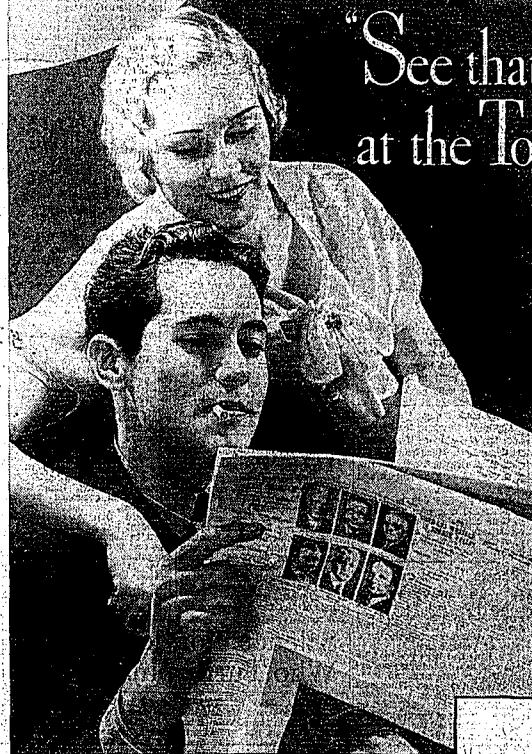

LOW COST FARM RELIEF

Mr. Average Citizen will doubtless hope that Secretary of Agriculture Wallace was right when he said that the maximum processing taxes on wheat, called for under the government's current acreage reduction plans, should not increase the retail price of bread by more than half a cent a loaf.

Secretary Wallace is quite right in pointing out that bread costs do not always follow the price of grain. A loaf of bread, as he remarks, often costs more when wheat prices are low than it does when they are high.

If the government is able to increase the price received by the farmer for his wheat without at the same time making the ordinary citizen pay more for his bread, it would seem that the biggest single obstacle in the way of the new farm relief plan will have been removed.

SILVER AND WORLD TRADE

The American delegation's proposal to London for an international plan to rehabilitate silver may yet turn out to be one of the best ideas advanced at the world conference of nations.

The world support given the plan by such nations as India, China, and Mexico—to say nothing of that which comes from European countries like Germany and Italy—indicates the important position that silver still holds in many parts of the world as a monetary base. Raise silver's value, and you automatically increase the purchasing power of vast sections of the world's population.

With that accomplished, a very substantial increase in international trade could be expected to follow. And since a revival of international trade is one of the prime aims of the conference, the possibilities inherent in the silver rehabilitation scheme are easy to comprehend.

A CALL TO ARMS

Appeal of the board of county commissioners for a unified effort to destroy noxious weeds on the Twin Falls and Salmon river tract is worthy of the consideration of all property owners and others, for there is no denying the fact that weeds are among the most noxious of southern Idaho agriculture.

The small seed crop of the weed is undependable, land becomes worthless, and the expense of destroying old weed crops is excessive, when proper attention is not given the destruction of noxious growths. The law still permits the county going onto infested areas and ridding them of their weeds, if landowners do not comply with the orders. But this trouble and added expense may be saved if individuals will take an active interest in the problem, which after all is their own, quite as much as anyone's else, and protect their own premises from the dangers of noxious weeds.

The county board this past winter and last year reduced the budget of the weed bureau because of the necessity for economy; in fact there was considerable agitation for elimination of the department altogether. Perhaps the bureau should have been maintained at its height, but since it was practically impossible to do so, now is no time to let noxious weeds get a hold on this tract with the resultant danger and cost to every property owner.

It will be well for every citizen who has any land under his control to watch closely for weeds, especially the noxious varieties, which cause needless losses to small seed crops and render land useless. The seed is carried in the irrigation water and may harm adjoining land and even land at a great distance.

With crops advancing in value it is all the more important this year that nothing be permitted which will detract from their value.

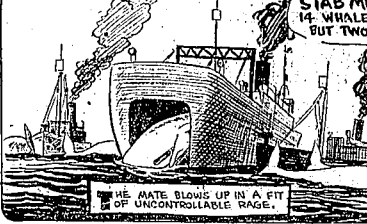

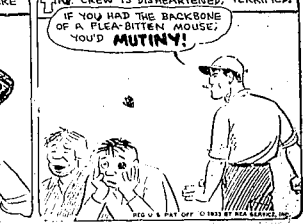
