WASHINGTON, Jan 5 (AP) — Federal Alcohol Administrator Choate today sent telegrams to governors of the 21 wet states, urging their co-operation in obtaining evidence of adulterated liquor sales which could be traced to wholesalers and manufacturers. The communication was forwarded to governors of Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, Washington, Wisconsin, Maryland, Michigan, Montana, Ne-

Asks Liquor Reports

His telegram: "We would be greatly obliged if you would inform us promptly of every well authenticated case brought to your attention in which sales of adulterated or unwholesome liquors can be traced back of the retailer to wholesalers or manufacturers, if supplied, with evidence in any such case, the federal alcohol control administration may be able to take prompt and

effective action which would aid in solving your law enforcement problems and would in any event be greatly helped in the performance of its own functions."

Choate made it clear that the FACA powers extend only to the producer and wholesaler. "It can and will, when it gets definite information which will enable it to pass intelligently on the complex

assertions that the multi-billion dollar expenditures of the administration must be considered "good investments," that large portions will be paid back by borrowers, and that the deficit really is not so large as it seems at first glance.

"The people must regard these expenditures in the light of the investments which will restore business and prosperity," said Rep. Hyman, Democratic floor leader.

Speaker Rainey pointed out that the deficit will be only about \$5,000,000 above the post-war debt, while Senator Harrison, Dem., Miss., and the government-all expenditure would make business so good that the budget would be balanced in 1935.

Senator Hyman, Dem., S. C., said that large sums of money lent by the Reconstruction Finance corporation to banks, railroads and other business would be paid back and that the deficit there would not really be large as it seems.

President Roosevelt's message mixed comment in the nation's press today. Many editors approved, and some were critical.

New York Times (Ind. Dem.) President Roosevelt's message committing to Congress the federal budget for the next fiscal year is to be commended for its absolute frankness. "The figures cited, and in fact, the president's statement of the entire financial outlook justify the commendation with which he insists upon maintaining 'the good credit of the government.' It must be good if it is to maintain such a staggering load of indebtedness."

Kansas City Times (Ind.) President Roosevelt does well to call the attention of Congress emphatically to the need of looking forward to tapering off huge governmental expenditures and balancing the budget. "Eventually the debt must be paid, if not out of earnings, then out of a generally lowered standard of living. An individual cannot recklessly squander himself into prosperity. Neither can a nation."

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'34 WORLD FAIR TO EXCEED 1933

Concessions Will Be Tripled
For Chicago Exposition
This Year

CHICAGO, Feb. 4.—An increase in concessions and concessions expenditures which will triple the employment of A Century of Progress for 1934 as compared with the 1933 fair was predicted today by fair officials.

The prediction was based on contracts already signed and on negotiations pending with concessionaires who had shown last summer and those looking for concessions for next year.

"We have figured it out," an official said, "that three times as much money will be spent by concessionaires in improving and beautifying their concessions, and in putting up new buildings at the 1934 fair as was the case at last summer's fair. That means more jobs and more money in circulation."

Seventeen contracts, most of them renewals, have been signed, and 75 are in process of negotiation. A total of \$10,000,000 in down payments has been received from the 17 signers. This money will be held in reserve until proper legislation has been passed by the state legislature and the Chicago South Park Board, enabling the fair to receive it.

TEXAN PLANNING \$700 AIRPLANES

Fort Worth Plant Preparing
To Enter Market by
June, 1934

FORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 4.—A manufacturing plant, to be established here, will start turning out an airplane to sell for \$700, or less, and be ready for the market by June, E. G. (Bowie) Thompson, head of the Rhythm Aircraft, Inc., has announced.

The ship will be an all-metal, two-place monoplane with a cabin and a light engine, six-cylinder motor, Thompson said. It will have a top speed of 120 miles an hour and a low landing speed.

It will be constructed along the lines of the "Bowie" recommended by the Federal Aviation Commission in information gathered from questionnaires sent to 33,000 three-cylinder light aircraft owners. Thompson is a World War pilot and has had considerable experience both in the mechanics and business angles of aviation.

Big Bill Will Play Against Ellsworth Vines in Pro Net Match

TWIN FALLS, Jan. 5 (AP).—William T. Tilden, 28, dean of American tennis, rated Henri Cochet of France as greatest player he ever played, and the ace of his all-time tennis team.

For about court games and stroke production, Tilden knows none who ever equalled the dapper little Frenchman, who for years was one of the mainstays in French Davis Cup play. Cochet recently turned professional.

Nature's "Big Ten" After last night's dinner at the Algonquin in honor of Tilden's 28th birthday, former United States amateur champion, who recently joined the pro ranks, Tilden named his Big Ten. He ranked the 10 best amateurs or professionals against whom he had competed, as follows:

1. Henri Cochet of France; 2. Norman Brookes of Australia; 3. Rene Lacoste of France; 4. Hans Kuhn of Germany; 5. Little Bill Johnston of California; 6. Billie Knight of New York; 7. Jean Borotra of France; 8. H. Karel Williams of Belgium; 9. Billie Barnes of Texas; and 10. Sorel Kosciuszko of Czechoslovakia.

Tilden added runners that he was negotiating to have various American and foreign amateur turn professionals. He said, however, he would not be surprised to see Clifford Davis of New Orleans turn to commercial play during the next year. He had dreamed this matter over with Sorel, but admitted he had not been satisfied with his offer. George M. Lott of Chicago also might turn professional, but not with me, I don't want him.

Tilden said Jack Crawford, the Australian ace, might join the pro ranks if Australia failed to give Davis Cup this year.

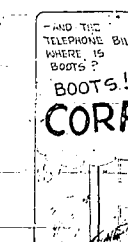
