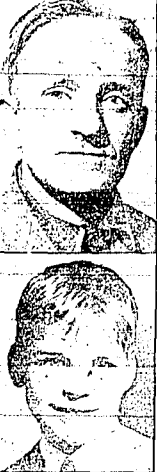

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ASSESSORS CUT RATE ON CATTLE

Tax Valuation on Sugar, Bees Also Reduced at Annual State Meeting

Cattle, bees, sugar and hay boards carried the sympathy of county assessors of the state, gathered in annual session at Boise this week, with the result that these items are to receive generous consideration at the hands of tax collectors. It was revealed here today by J. D. Barnhart, who returned last night from the session.

Barnhart served on the legislative committee of the gathering, and was appointed by Gov. High, newly-elected president, to continue his services on that committee this year.

Barnhart says that sugar assessments have been cut from \$1.50 to \$1.75 a bag, and stands of bees from \$2 to \$1.50 each. Large billboards, which have been variously assessed by the different counties at from \$8 to \$100 each, will this year bear a flat \$25 rate. There variations will be carried at the same figures as assessed, but "extra" rates will be lowered, on the following schedule: Heretofore from \$10 to \$25 and up, to \$10; from \$10 to \$30; range from \$8 to \$30, stock and range, from \$30 to \$40, herd, from \$25 to \$20; and dairy, from \$20 to \$15.

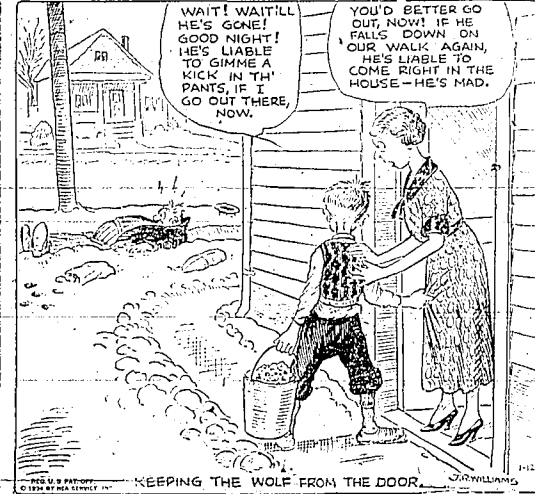

GERMAN JOBLESS DECLINE IN 1933

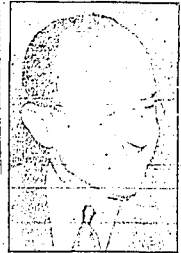
Unemployment Lessens Under Hitler Regime During Past Year

BERLIN, Jan. 11.—The striking feature of the development of the German economic situation during 1933 was a sharp decline in unemployment.

The number of the unemployed fell from 6,000,000 in the latter part of 1932 to 4,000,000 in the latter part of 1933.

The decline in unemployment was due to a combination of factors, including the expansion of public works and the reduction of working hours.

WHEAT-SURPLUS SALES ARE HIGH

Nearly 10,000,000 bushels of Northwest Grain Sold For Exportation

WASHINGTON, (UP)—Sales of nearly 10,000,000 bushels of Pacific northwest wheat by the National Grains Export Association in the program to reduce farm surpluses were reported by Frank A. Threlk, chief of the AAA grain processing and marketing section. Some of the sales were in the form of flour.

Purchases for export are equivalent to 10,750,000 bushels, Threlk said. The association has sold 5,550,000 bushels and shipped about 5,000,000 bushels.

Threlk explained that the association was formed under a marketing agreement providing that exports be reduced by the AAA for the difference between the price for wheat bought at domestic rates and the lower world price level at which such wheat is sold. Reduction of surpluses in Washington, Oregon and Idaho are the special object of the selling program.

The average differential payment between purchases and sales to date has been about 21 cents a bushel. Threlk said. The 10,000,000 bushels bought to date was to represent about one-third of the amount contemplated by the marketing agreement.

Air Line Stewardesses Have Fascinating New Profession

Supple green uniforms, unbecomingly thin green overalls capped off at an amazing angle; appearance of grooming sans hint of cold cream or cosmetics; faces and figures guaranteed to make any man look twice and still bring a scornful snort for the Little Red Riding Hood of the air.

It is a new profession for women, transcontinental airline stewardesses, already has its own job title—the newest profession for those who fly can pick them, then fly away from the lungs.

It is a distinctive vocation, for gradually, the stewardesses has assumed the position of conductor, ticket checker, porter and purser. This leaves the job of flying to the pilot and makes them the only women who give their full attention to this task.

She's Chief

Let's hear from Miss Ida Nuvall, chief stewardess of United Airlines western division. Having flown approximately eight million miles throughout America, and having charge of training at Cheyenne, she qualifies as an authority.

"Hurling through the air at three miles a minute, chatting with some of the world's notables and most interesting people to passengers enough for anybody."

"But the stewardess must be more than a hostess or companion to chat with the notables. There are half a dozen other things that she must be equipped to do."

"Must be prepared

"To meet the pilot, to be considered must be a trained nurse. For in her institutional training, under strict discipline, the nurse learned to accept the mental part of her tasks in a split of a second."

"The air stewardesses merry passengers or pilots?" she was asked.

"Pilots or the boy from the 'old home town,' Miss Nuvall declared. "They are statistically more staid, more serious and more interested in the flight. But their duties are too general to allow time for long talks."

"The nature of their work keeps the stewardesses in trim. They must not be over five or seven inches fat. Their weight must be kept under 150 pounds. Their hospital training has instilled regular habits and self-discipline."

ROOSEVELT AIMS TO HIT TAMMANY

Administration Laying Plans To "Freeze Out" Tiger In New York

WASHINGTON, (UP) President Roosevelt's political advisers are completing strategy for a determined battle by which they expect to "freeze out" Tammany hall, the party leader John F. Curry, and to strip away the power of the hall in New York City.

Editor of Joseph McKee, Independent Democrat who was thrust into the recent mayoral election by the administration, to defeat the Fusion Republican, Charles F. Murphy, has convinced administration politicians that Tammany must be crushed before the gubernatorial and congressional elections next fall.

At the first move, it is said, Postmaster Ely plans to place an administration man in charge of federal and state patronage in New York City. This man will be anti-Tammany but a figure will be shown to Tammany district leaders and one called to win their support in time.

Secondly, the plan calls for creation of new boroughs of Queens, Richmond and Brooklyn. These boroughs, together with the existing one in the Bronx, gradually will sweep Tammany out of the Manhattan stronghold and break Curry's grip there, the strategists hope.

Japan Population Expands Million

TOKYO (UP)—The population of Japan proper on Oct. 1 was 67,238,690. The statistical bureau of the cabinet announced. The number shows an increase of 942,690 compared with the figure for the same day of 1932.

Of the total population, 32,706,440 were men, and 34,432,250 were women. The population in urban areas totaled 20,914,800, while in rural districts there were 46,323,890. Compared with the fiscal year ago, the urban population increased 1,111,000, while the rural population decreased 108,600.

Of 28 cities Tokyo had the largest population with 5,680,200, Osaka came next with 2,654,340 and Kyoto third with 1,023,000. Nagoya is a close fourth, 859,600.
