Home Owners Plan Corporation records show that loans being extended at the rate of \$3,000,000 daily.

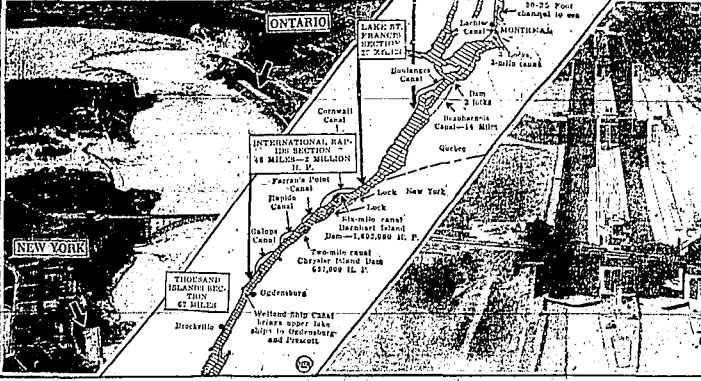

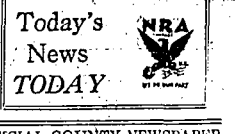

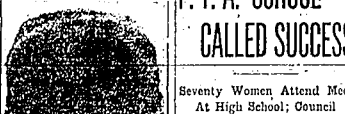

One big sheep man asks this newspaper to reiterate that in the opinion of many members of the association the denunciatory statements leveled at the present national administration were uncalled for and adds: "The majority of sheep men greatly appreciate what the Roosevelt administration has done for the sheep industry..."

Adding its bit to the answer to the arguments of President D. Sid Smith of the association, the Boise Capital News says editorially:

"The wool industry of Idaho has profited to a greater extent from the 'experimentation' of which he so bitterly complains than has any other industry."

The Boise paper continues:

"Seeing no good whatever in the general governmental set-up under the 'experimental laboratory for college professors,' Smith nevertheless had a few words of half-praise to utter for the Regional Agricultural Credit corporation."

This is the particular branch of the "experimental laboratory" which undoubtedly has saved the wool industry in Idaho from dropping below the zero point, which Mr. Smith thought impossible.

The hide goes with the tallow, Mr. Smith. If you like the Regional Agricultural Credit corporation for the wool men, you must, in fairness, like the RFC which saved the banks from a similar situation, the CCC which saved hundreds of thousands of American youths from misery and gangsterism, the NRA which put many millions back to work at a living wage; the CWA which this winter is providing the necessities of life for untold families. And other "experimentations" too numerous to mention.

Please back up to last March 4th, Mr. Smith, and do your denouncing and criticizing from that point on the calendar.

We're all living in the era that began on that date. And most of the members of your association fully appreciate what that means, whether you do or not.

REWARD IS DUE

Most Americans will agree that there is substantial justice in the plan to grant Finland a material reduction in its debt to the United States.

Finland, in case you have forgotten, is the one European nation which has been paying its debt to this country punctually and fully. Finland is a small nation and a poor one; but while such great powers as France and England have found their debt payments too irksome to meet, Finland has paid one hundred cents on the dollar whenever a note fell due.

Now the State Department is negotiating with the Finnish government for a substantial reduction in the debt. Congress will have to approve any such settlement, of course, to make it binding; but there is little doubt that Congress will do it without delay. A European debtor that actually pays its debts is a rare enough phenomenon to deserve special treatment.

PURIFIED PROHIBITION

Prohibition forces, calling the roll in their shattered ranks after the disastrous defeat of 1933, find that they still have much to be thankful for. Bishop Ernest G. Richardson, head of the Anti-Saloon League, points out that there still are 25 dry states, and adds that there are extensive dry territories in practically all the wet states.

Whether this dry area will be extended or diminished in the near future is wholly a matter for guesswork. But viewing the whole problem in the light of the last decade's experience, one is inclined to believe that prohibition today, in the areas where it does exist, is on a much sounder basis than was the case prior to repeal of the 18th amendment.

A dry state, henceforth, can be assumed to be a state that is dry because prohibition suits the majority of its inhabitants, and not because it has been forced to conform to a law that the majority dislikes. There is a world of difference.

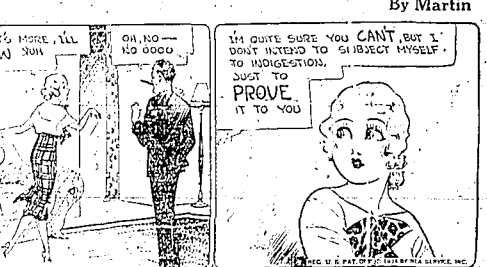
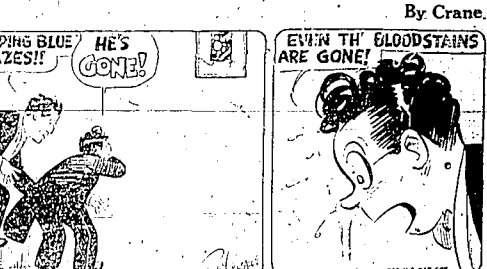
