## HEALTH PROJECT

### LAUNCHED HERE

Federal Child Aid Program Will Be Carried Out In County

Mrs. Elizabeth Smith, president of the Fourth District Nurses' association, announced today the launching of a child health recovery project in Twin Falls county.

Dr. L. J. Peterson, of the state department of public welfare, and Dr. Harman Tremaine, part time medical director of the federal child health recovery project for Idaho, were here and explained the work at a meeting at the Lincoln school yesterday afternoon.

Twenty field nurses, who will carry out the project, school superintendents and city and county school nurses, Mrs. Smith is district director of the territory which includes Canyon, Cassia, Minidoka, Lincoln, Gooding, Jerome, and Twin Falls counties. She will be assisted in this county by Mrs. Gladys Zentler, Boise; Miss Helen Lottman, Twin Falls; and Miss Ethel Burns, Kimberly.

Three aims The work, which is sponsored by the child welfare bureau of the United States and federal emergency relief administration, has a three-fold objective. Children will be examined for location of defects. The defects will be corrected and nutrition problems will be studied for correction of deficiencies. The program will be carried on through the schools and emergency nursery schools, with the first and third parties necessarily being given most emphasis at first. Funds come through CWA channels.

Idaho has been allotted one state director of nurses; six district directors of nurses; 60 field nurses; and one part-time medical director. An executive committee, headed by Parker Carver, state administrator of the Federal Emergency Relief and CWA funds, has charge of the work in the entire state.

Dr. Peterson and Dr. Tremaine assisted Mrs. Edith P. Suppington, regional director, here last Friday to present phases of the project to the South Side Medical association.
