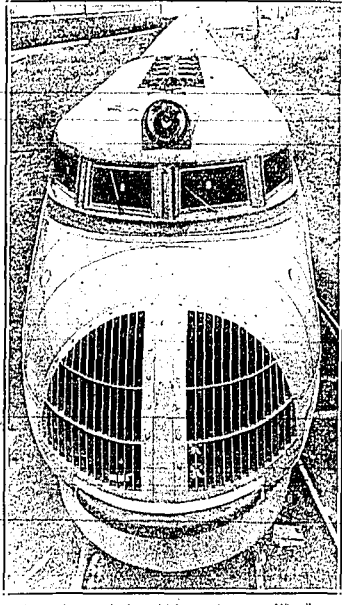

NEW YORK—The chorus girls' linnen has changed into a song of halcyon days, happy days are here again, and everything is not only rosy, but hot-cha and also hey-hey. There are jobs.

Jobs for night little ponies who know how to dance, jobs for tall puerilities who know how to walk, jobs for girls who know how to talk, jobs for girls who know how to sing, jobs for girls who know how to pose and posture in some diaphanous tulle.

Not many of these jobs are on the legitimate stage. The remarkably prosperous theatrical season has been all the more unusual because of an unprecedented lull of musical comedies and revues.

It's the cabaret, the music hall but on the big scale, modernized, glorified and legitimized that offers the chorus girl her big chance. Relatively few prohibition night clubs had any room for a floor show. The new type of establishment—really only a revival of pre-war cabarets of once—has to have them, bigger and larger than ever, and with big-name stars and specialty fields in acts and music. Such places are really theaters, even if the customers sit at tables instead of in rows of plush seats.

A couple of decades ago the Palais Royal was one of the brightest and legitimized. Recently a club potentate named Ben Corning restored it to its place in the spotlight. When the proprietors had carried off a few tons of the old gilded decorations, a d d d architect had done some work and there was a spacious room quietly done in blue and tan, and scalzag, a thousand people at tables or tables so that everybody could see the stage.

### COSTIGAN BILL ENGAGES SOLOONS

#### Sugar Legislation Fight in Senate Led by Idaho Junior Senator

BY RALPH W. OLINSTEAD  
WASHINGTON, Mar. 2 (Special)—The center of attraction for vociferous is the Costigan anti-sugar bill. A complex and little understood situation is presented. The tariff commission, Republicans and Democratic members alike, after an investigation of costs of production, has shown that a recommended reduction of half a cent a pound in the sugar tariff will mean a loss of something to the farmer of which Idaho produces an amount which would suffer a fall of price. The Costigan bill was introduced to prevent the impending price drop, and at the same time commodity and placing it under control of the A.A.A.

... A processing tax of \$1.25 per ton would be imposed to raise the price to \$5.00 or nearly triple from its present \$2.50. Production would be limited to a quota to be established by the department of agriculture, which would select 1,400,000 short tons, of the U. S. quota compared with 3,700,000 short tons which was last year's production. As to the quota, Senator James H. Poy has taken the lead in the sugar bloc and insists on an increase in the U. S. quota to the average of the last two years production and a reduction in the Philippine and Cuban quotas. He is also insisting on a provision of control of Secretary Wallace who is not favorable to the domestic sugar industry. Senator Poy has indicated confidence in the chances for the amendment in this regard. The quota will be provided in the bill and will be voted.

... The next question presented in the proceeding tax. The references are made to the tax, but they, of course, will pass it on to the consumer. Nevertheless, the information has been furnished to the senator that they are trying to make the growers take one-half of the tax by a reduction of the quota in beet price. To correct this situation, Senator Poy proposes an amendment making it illegal for any grower to pass the tax on to the grower—insisting that the tax be paid by the grower. To soothe the feelings of the growers, a provision will be made to gradually cut down the amount of refined sugar admitted to this country, starting in 1935 or will be admitted, and refined here, bringing more business to American companies.

... If all these amendments are made—which seems likely—beet growers will get a better price, and refiners will get a fine of about \$1,000 per day if they need to import sugar in any quantities. Remarks by those in a position to know indicate that the administration will consent to the amended bill.
