MANHATTAN WINS TITLE ON TRACK

New York College Captures I. C. 4-A Crown at Indoor Meet

NEW YORK, Mar. 6 (AP)—Manhattan College athletes today were crowned new monarchs of the track. They clinched a four-year drive to national prominence last night by smothering through to the team championship in the 13th annual intercollegiate A. A. A. indoor championships at Madison Square Garden.

Nearly 10,000 fans saw the green-jerseyed Manhattan team give an upset in a meet that was featured by Bill Bontrons's thrilling 1,000 meter victory over Gene Jack Kirk of Monck Park, N. Y., and by the establishment of four indoor intercollegiate records in the final events.

Automatic Records
In addition six records were written automatically into the books in the evening events which were contested over metric distances for the first time. Coach Pete Winter's well-trained Manhattan youngsters rolled up 28 1/2 points to win over New York University, 102-102, champions; by four points, and by the defending champion, Yale and a half, Cornell, which led in the meet, finished fourth with 14, while Columbia came fifth with 11.

Manhattan, which last year finished third in this meet, won on a 4 one first time last night, but distributed its strength through the foot-races and rolled up enough point positions to win another track meet. The winners were their first place in the 3,000-meter hurdle finish.

Princeton's Bill Bontrons nose-out Pennsylvania's Gene Venzke with another of his characteristic whirlwind finishes in the 1,500-meter, as was expected. For the third time in the series, Venzke, the Princeton runner blazed through to a one-stop victory.

Venzke also entered the 3,000-meter run, but fell on the first lap and dropped out after 500 yards.

Indoor intercollegiate records were broken in the four sets of the N. Y. U., who established a new mark of 6 feet 5 1/4 inches in the pole vault. William Hill, Nichols, Bowdoin, who heaved the 10-pound shot to a new 39 feet 10 inches, and Henry Grey, Princeton, who hurled the 25-pound weight to a new 65 feet 2 1/2 inches.

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OUTRAGES

It is not easy to condone suicide, but in this case, it is quite probable that Utley only hastened his judgment. He thereby saved himself much grief and Minidoka county and the state all it would have cost to prosecute him.

The shocking crimes he committed could never have been vindicated, and if ever there were fears that his life would be forcibly taken, then he has saved an enraged citizenry the trouble.

He was in fact a criminal at large, just the kind for which jails and penitentiaries are erected, and should have been there long ago.

This county, only recently outraged by the murder of a police officer, joins with Minidoka county in deploring the loss of its sheriff under such conditions, and calls upon law enforcement agencies to clamp down a little harder on all known criminal characters, to the end that this section shall not again be subjected to such indignities as have been heaped upon it within a 30-day period.

STILL YOUNG IN IDEAS

Senator Norris of Nebraska is getting to be a fairly elderly man. But he never seems to get tired of fighting for sweeping changes in government, and his newest program is one that many a younger man, with long years ahead of him, well might fight shy of.

What the senator now proposes is a change in the Nebraska state government which would substitute as a single body of from 30 to 50 men for the existing state legislature.

Senator Norris believes that the bi-cameral legislature is unwieldy and not always responsive to public opinion, so he would abolish it boldly, install a simple mechanism in its place—and, he believes, in that way carry a more efficient and representative state government.

How far he will get with this program remains to be seen. Senator Norris has a way of hanging on like grim death until he gets what he wants.

And his proposal is at least an interesting one. Will he be able to "sell" it to the people of Nebraska?

HONORING THE ENEMY

The ways of a statesman sometimes are a trifle hard to figure out. Austria's Chancellor Dollfuss seems to be the latest to contribute a riddle of statesmanlike behavior.

Trying to patch up the wounds which he helped to inflict on his tortured country, the chancellor the other day pleaded for national harmony and remarked that "we cannot but respect the bravery of the Socialists and their loyalty to their ideals." And, he added, "we must do all we can to heal the open wounds."

Yet on the same day, he hanged another Socialist leader, sentenced two more to life imprisonment, padlocked all Socialist bookstores, and saw to it that all Socialist newspapers were removed from circulation.

As a method of healing open wounds and showing respect for the bravery of one's opponents, this would seem to be almost unique.

TROUBLE IN UNIFORM

Dispatches from London report that the British government seriously is considering action to disband all uniformed political bodies, such as the Fascist black shirts organized by Sir Oswald Mosley.

England never has been plagued with these organizations to the extent that continental countries have been; nevertheless, it is beginning to have difficulties with them, and during the last six months of 1933 no fewer than 22 disturbances in which men wearing political uniforms were involved were reported.

As a general thing, it can be said that when political parties take to organizing their young men into semi-military bodies, dressed in distinctive uniforms, there is trouble ahead.

Collier will attend a preliminary conference with 500 representatives of tribes in Wyoming, Montana, Dakota and Nebraska, which ended formally Sunday but Collier remained for further informal conferences.

Northwest Parley
Another group of federal officials, headed by Collier's wife, Weechee, will meet with Indians of the northwest at Salem, Ore., March 8 and 9.

The purpose of all these conferences is to gain the support of the Indians for the Howard-Wheeler bill, which Collier strongly supports. It would provide for eventual self-government among Indian tribes, allocate lands in some instances and continue the status of the Navajo and Hopi as dependent Indian reservations.

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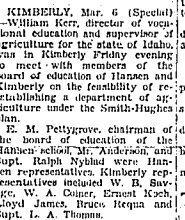
