Leaders Select Two Boards for Johnson Parley on NRA Program

HOOR SLASH DEMANDED

Definite Action Expected to Bring Work Restoration, Higher Wages

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—Industrialists at the NRA conference today selected two groups to work with Administrator H. S. Johnson in an effort to whip into practical form the administration's program for further employment and higher wages.

They were faced with warnings from Johnson that the government expected many industries to reduce hours 10 per cent and that there would be an unprecedented wave of strikes unless labor's recovery aid was fully recognized.

Asks Parley Johnson asked selection of two committees of 12 to meet with him in their belief they could expedite action on the bills by general discussions which were closed for the most part last night.

Consumers goods industries held a similar meeting under the chairmanship of George Houston, president of the Cotton Textile Institute.

Henry Wise Wood, president of the Newspaper Publishers' corporation, New York City, in response to Johnson's request for more details.

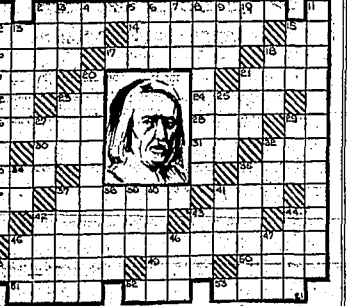

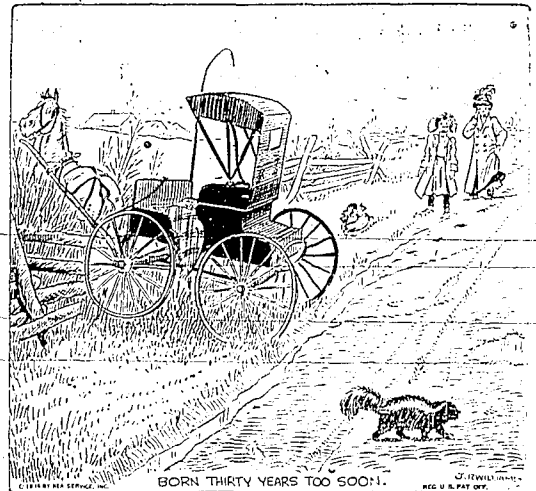

EMERGENCY CROP LOANS AVAILABLE

Farmers May Obtain U. S. Aid If Cooperating With Control Plan

SPOKANE, (Special)—Farmers may obtain an emergency crop loan from the \$40,000,000 fund recently made available by congress if they need credit and cannot obtain it elsewhere and they are co-operating with the production control program of the agricultural adjustment administration, according to a statement made today by H. M. Carwood, production credit commissioner of the farm credit administration.

The loan will be repaid separately from production credit association loans. The emergency crop loan fund is an emergency relief measure for this year, only to aid those who cannot qualify for credit through the regular channels of a production credit association, Carwood said.

The loan will be repaid primarily to make loans not exceeding the cash cost of growing crops during 1934, for summer, fall, and for winter wheat to be planted in 1934 and harvested in 1935.

The amount from the fund will exceed \$1,000,000, may be used to make loans to purchase feed for livestock in areas designated by the governor of the farm credit administration as drought and semi-drought.

Maximum amount which will be made available to any one farmer this year is \$250, and the minimum is \$25, according to the regulations. Interest rate will be five and one-half per cent. Detailed regulations will be placed in the hands of local emergency crop loan committees soon. The time and place where those committees will receive applications will be made known locally within a short time.

Applications for loans from \$25 to \$150 may be made directly to the emergency crop loan office provided the applicants do not have sufficient security to obtain loans elsewhere.

SHOW TO GET SOUTH IDAHO DOG ENTRIES

Entrants from the south central states are expected to compete for prizes at the Bonheur county kennel club's all-breed dog show in Pocatello March 20 and 31, according to word received here today from George Ellis, treasurer, member of the arrangements committee.

Sponsored by Bonheur county sportsmen, the show will include all breeds in addition to hunting dogs. Proceeds from the show will be used to propagate game birds in the Pocatello region. The dog exhibit, according to Ellis, is expected to develop into hunting dog trials, to be held at Twin Falls, and at Pocatello later in the year.

Taylor Williams, Gooding, will be judge for the hunting class at the Pocatello show Ellis said. Owners desiring to enter dogs from this section may secure blanks from Dr. Groomer.

HATCHERY CODE GUARDS BUYERS

New AAA Regulations Help Assure Elimination of Fraud Practices

MOSSCO, Ind. (Special)—Hatchery check purchasers this year will benefit from the provisions of the hatchery code which became effective in January, according to a bulletin from AAA officials.

When chicks, poultry, or stocklings are bought from those who come under the code the buyer is protected on quality, time of delivery, and loss adjustments. Features of hatcheries to live up to the various provisions are: provide only first-class stock; eliminate the practice of fraudulent or deceptive advertising; assure substitution of other chicks when special qualities have been advertised; would also be abolition of the new order size regulation.

The size of hatching eggs used should come under the code is strictly regulated. Eggs used must average not less than 52 grams per dozen and no individual egg is expected to weigh less than one and five-sixths ounces. This measure is intended to improve egg size generally, through holding up laying stock which will carry the incubator's tendency to produce large eggs. Farmers who breed, hatch, and sell hatching eggs should be inspected to insure quality, or who produce hatching eggs for sale are also given protection through the laws against misleading advertising, and through the provisions which call for premium prices for hatching eggs sold by those who come under the code.

POCATELLO, Mar. 8 (Special)—Patrolman William W. McElroy, 37, veteran policeman, died from heart attack here yesterday.

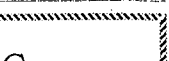

SAFETY OF AIR TRAVEL GAINING

Kansas City Report Reveals Decreasing Margin of Plane Mishaps

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (Special)—An index to the increasing safety of air travel was contained in the annual report of Roy C. Everett, manager of the Kansas City municipal airport.

The report showed that 42,859 passengers embarked or disembarked from planes at the airport in 1933 without any accidents.

When a total of 19,109 landings and 18,240 takeoffs, only two serious accidents and one fatality occurred, according to the report.

Total tonnage of mail carried at the airport showed a decrease. The tonnage totaled 204,286, a decrease of 78,039 pounds under 1932.

Total passenger business, including commercial transport and army operations, showed a gain of 6,000 for the year bringing the 1933 total to 51,056. Despite restricted military flying, a total of 1,553 army flyers used the airport in 1933.
