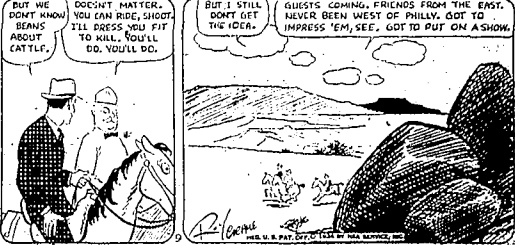

MONTANA JUDGE QUITS U. S. JOB

Bourquin May Run for Senate Post, Bores Court Restrictions

HELENA, Mont. Mar. 9 (U.P.)—Federal Judge George M. Bourquin has tendered his resignation to President Roosevelt.

It became effective May 17, when he intends to enter the race for United States senator from Montana.

The resignation indicates Bourquin was dissatisfied by the restriction of jurisdiction of district courts, which threatens to reduce to a glorified police tribunal.

Bourquin has served 22 years on the federal bench in Montana.

The silver-haired jurist declined to make a definite statement of the reasons for his departure, but it is tacitly understood that he will be a senatorial candidate.

Bourquin is expected to be followed shortly by statements from former Congressman Scott Leavitt of Great Falls and another state senator from Ravalli county, and Republican floor leader of the special session of the legislature.

Wheeler in Race

Incumbent Senator C. Wheeler and J. E. Erickson are expected to be candidates for reelection. In Erickson's case, his candidacy would be for the two-year term left by the death of J. J. Walsh and by the subsequent two-year appointment by Gov. Frank Cooney.

Characteristically, Cooney marked Bourquin's letter to Roosevelt, the President as follows:

"In accordance with the act of Feb. 25, 1910, amending section 1010 of the judicial code, the salary, expense and tender may be retained in respect to the office of judge of the United States district court in and for Montana, to take effect May 17, 1934; and after 30 days of such service, 22 of them on this bench and more than my three predecessors combined."

"Police Tribunal"

The restriction of the jurisdiction of the district courts to reduce them to glorified police tribunals. In consequence, although court decisions continue to be of great usefulness and honor, I am persuaded that the very great debt to the generous and kindly people of Montana, may be more, more than during perhaps any time in the history of this state, due to the liberality and other occupations of Bourquin, actively and effectively, and I greatly advise you, sir, to the end that usual preliminary do not prevent timely appointment of a successor, to the delay justice to these people.

"Whether or not exercise of this, my statutory right requires consent, may it please you, Mr. President, to signify your acceptance."

Curried Eggs on Brown Rice Offer Ideal Table Dish for Lent Season

Letting dishes are in order and every housewife knows that they offer excellent opportunities to make use of eggs and other substitutes. She also knows that her family quickly tires of plain scrambled, boiled or poached eggs and that it's up to her to use imagination in collecting appetizing dishes from the same old ingredients.

Maybe she'd like to rely on a curried hash now and then. There are many such recipes to which nothing appetizing is lacking.

One is curried eggs on brown rice. Try making it this way:

Put four tablespoons of butter and four tablespoons of flour in a hot pan and blend them thoroughly. Add two cups of rich milk, salt, pepper and curry powder to taste. When you serve this dish again, that's almost inevitable once you've tasted it. It is about one-half cupful of milk from a coconut. It will give the sauce a different flavor.

Well one could smother a cup of brown rice in four cups of water until tender. Wash the cooked rice in cold water to remove excess starch and put in a pan, covered with wax paper. Set the pan in a hot water bath. The rice is very hot. This makes the grains fluffy.

When ready to serve, place rice in a hot serving dish, cover with whole boiled eggs (two to a person) and pour the curry sauce over them.

Expert Says Economic Forces Will Prevent Conflict For 10 Years

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Economic forces will prevent war in Europe for 10 years, Small Langley, well known writer on European affairs, said in an interview here. Profound economic recovery are absorbing the entire energies of the people, he said.

Langley, who recently returned from an extensive tour of Europe, is the author of "The New Deal in Europe," a book just published by Funk and Wagnalls.

The New Deal under Langley reports is a hundred times more rigid and severe than the Roosevelt plan in Europe. It is being enacted by force, while in the United States, recovery and reform is effected by moral suasion, he asserted.

CCC HEAD PLANS NEW PERSONNEL

Replacement of Workers By Other Recruits Proposed By Director

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Almost complete replacement of personnel of the civilian conservation corps is expected during this winter, the director here today disclosed to accommodate probably 250,000 recruits.

CCC Director Robert Fechner announced that by direction of the President none of the present 303,525 unemployed young men and war veterans now in the corps would be permitted to remain more than 12 to 15 months after their original enlistment date.

May 10 Enlist

All members of the corps will be discharged on April 1. As a result they will have served a year at that time, all who desire may re-enlist for varying periods.

Those who joined in April, May and June, 1933, may remain until the end of the year, but will be replaced by new recruits chosen by state agencies assigned by the labor department and veteran administration.

Fechner estimated 100,000 men would leave the corps this month to seek other employment. He believed 250,000 fresh recruits would be taken in on the April 1, July 1 and other enlistment dates.

No expansion beyond the present authorized total strength of 303,525 is contemplated, Fechner said.

The Lowell collector started his china dog kennel when he became fascinated by two black dogs, called "Black Jacks," in a Portland, Me., antique shop a quarter century ago. The pair remain the most valuable in his collection.

Most of the dogs in the collection were made in the British Isles or in Germany, and all are examples of Newfoundland dogs, varying only in acting, color or posture.

Witts also collects coins, rugs, scrap and antiques, but his dogs are the most intriguing.

NICOTINE TAMED AS SMOKING TOY

Provides Pleasure Sought By Tobacco Users, Survey Points Out

NEW YORK (U.P.)—Pleasure derived from smoking tobacco has been traced to the absorption of minute doses of nicotine by the mouth.

Results obtained through experiments reported in Science, the journal of The American Association for the Advancement of Science, and conducted by Drs. H. W. Engard and A. G. Coates, of New York, have indicated that the former theories—of which held that the satisfaction of smokers was linked with pyridine (a product of combustion)—are groundless. Pyridine, it was pointed out, occurs in such a minute amount in tobacco as to be undetectable in the mouth.

Nicotine, incidentally, was named for Jean Nicot, who introduced tobacco chewing to Catherine de Medici.

TREASURY HEAD BORROWS CASH FOR TAXI FARE
