## MINING SECTIONS RAP MORGENTHAU SILVER AT STUDE

West Bitterly Disapproves of  
Treasury Secretary's  
Stand on Metal

ATTACKS 'SMOKE SCREEN'  
Malone Declares U. S. Needs  
Additional Basis for  
Monetary System

DENVER, Colo., Mar. 16 (AP)—  
The mining west, which many  
years ago began a fight to force  
a return to use of silver as  
money on a ratio with gold, today  
expressed bitter disapproval of  
Secretary of the Treasury  
Morgenthau's statement yesterday  
that the government would not  
change in the present govern-  
ment policy toward the white  
metal.

At the same time, adherents of  
the "free coinage" bloc made no  
secret of their disapproval of  
those who are advocating use of  
silver as a "major commodity."  
The following statement of  
George W. Malone, state engineer  
for Nevada and chairman of the  
Western States Silver committee,  
is typical of the attitude of the  
silver western "free coinage"  
silver booster.

"The statement of Morgenthau  
relative to private holdings of  
silver is a gross misstatement  
of the facts. It is a gross propo-  
sition of silver legislation is typi-  
cal of the smoke screens thrown  
out by the government to keep  
the public from seeing the facts  
which are so plain and so evi-  
dent that the silver advoca-  
tes are strong enough to in-  
fluence the government's policy  
at any time."

The Libson silver agreement  
is being used to force a change  
in the commodity class and  
to prevent legislation that would  
set it at a primary money metal  
and regulate its price to that of  
gold.

Need More Metal  
"The fact that the administra-  
tion has the same power to pre-  
vent legislation as it has to en-  
force it, is a fact which has been  
had in the case of gold, and it  
was obvious Morgenthau's state-  
ment yesterday was a smoke  
screen."

Malone said there is a need for  
more silver in the monetary  
system of the United States

with police here last night.

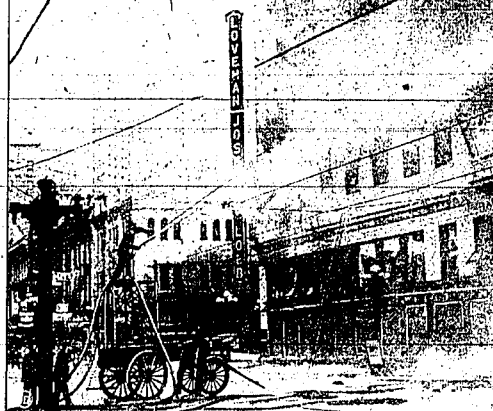
Clarence Marx, police officer

Ontario Confirms Extradition  
To Chicago After Long  
Legal Battle

TORONTO, Ont., Mar. 16

SURRENDERS TO OFFICIALS

GAMBLING CITED BY SILVER BLOC

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16 (AP)—Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau today announced his investigation of speculative silver holdings had shown money advocates were not "highly disinterested" in their silver views.  
The treasury went over a large mass of charts and various silver market producers...  
After the conference the secretary of the treasury department was constantly studying the silver problem and felt that world militancy in the London silver agreement would "go a long way toward stabilizing prices."  
"I have an open mind on the next silver sale," Morgenthau said, but as long as things are getting better each week the time is not tight. That's the way I feel. I've never met a man who says that silver is a cure."  
The treasury had indicated that metal producers were not turning in their metal at the recently established equivalent of 64 cents and the London silver agreement at the mills and indicated that they were "gambling" on the price of the metal.  
He had no details of the treasury's recently inaugurated investigation into speculative silver holdings. The study has been proceeding for several weeks and one of the aims, he said, was to determine whether some advocates of additional silver currency were financially interested in the program.

JOB MANAGERS PLAN PROGRAM

Re-employment Heads Meet Here to Adopt Policy on Relief Work

Managers of national re-employment offices in nine southern Idaho counties, extending from Elmore to Mindoka and north to Blaine, assembled here yesterday afternoon for a conference with John W. Foreman, (recreation) state director, John Walters, chief architect, and Peter H. Cohn, special investigator.  
The meeting was held in the local employment office, located in the Sprague building, and was attended by Terry Hester, district supervisor.  
Plans, present and future programs and the general situation, and preparation made for handling the employment situation after the discontinuation of the CWA, April 1.  
The new policy will be to provide relief work to those with no other means of support. Foreman said and eligible persons will be designated by the relief committees in each county.  
It will be the purpose of the employment service, not only to assist in this new program, but to extend its facilities to industry and labor. There are 62 such employment offices in Idaho, manned by 110 persons. On the lists are the names of 86,000 persons, and records show that 70,000 have received CWA employment in the state. Public works administration jobs have given employment after the discontinuation of the CWA, he said.  
Foreman is engaged in making a survey of the state in anticipation of a trip he will make in Washington for a conference of all state directors April 13, 14 and 15.  
Meetings similar to the one held here were conducted on successive days this week at Coeur d'Alene, Weiser and Boise. There will be a conference at Idaho Falls today and one at Pocatello, Saturday.

NEGRO PRISONERS DIE ON GALLOWES

Three Convicted Assaulters Hanged Before Dawn in Mississippi Jail

JERIMANDO, Miss., Mar. 16 (AP)—Three Negro attackers of a 17-year-old girl died on the gallows just before dawn today at the DeSoto county jail.  
Departing from Mississippi tradition of executing the condemned men at noon, 200 national guardsmen secretly took the Negroes into Jerimando at 4 a. m. to avert possible clashes with outraged citizens.  
At 4:28 a. m. Jesse Howard walked to the gallows along a Negro apartment. The trap was sprung and he was pronounced dead 10 1/2 minutes later. The second man, Ernest McCreedy, a singing of hymns at 4:58. He was pronounced dead at 5:10.  
The last of the Negro assaulters, Johnny Jones, silently marched to the platform, the rope was adjusted and the steel trap door clanged at 6:25. It also took him 15 minutes to die.

"Nutria" Breeding Success in U. S.

OLATHE, Kan. (AP)—James C. Manning, who imported the first nutria, or South American beaver, to this country, believes the demand for the animals (fur will result in numerous domestic breeding farms in the United States).  
The nutria, unlike the North American coon, does not indulge in tree cutting and dam building, but seems content to eat heartily of carrots, other vegetables and weeds, and swim about in a tank.  
The animals are easily raised, according to Manning, who now has 35.  
It is an old custom in Sardinia to purchase several nutrias as witnesses in court. The testimony is considered true if one of the animals hears it without sign of dissent.
