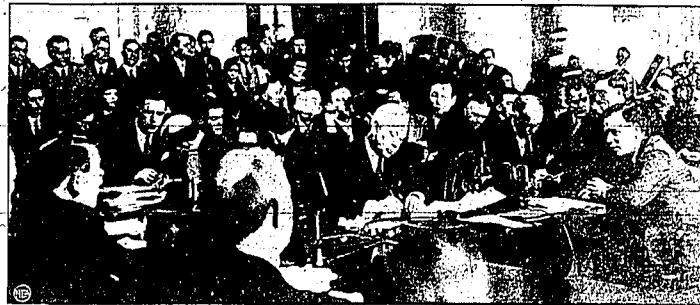

EFFORT AT 'FOUR MINUTE MILE' SHIFTS TO OUTDOOR MEETS

KANSAS BREAKS INDOOR RECORD

Cunningham Runs Sensational Race in Final Clash on Board Tracks

NEW YORK, Mar. 19 (AP)—Four minutes and 10.4 seconds, the four-minute mile, now shifts to the outdoors, after featuring the most successful indoor track season in history.

Charles Cunningham, the Kansas powerhouse, rang down the indoor curtain with a bang Saturday night at the Astoria, Ore. track. The two-year-old world board track mile record of 4:10 was broken by Cunningham in 4:04.4.

This is just eight tenths of a second slower than the sensational world record set by Cunningham in 1932, when he was runner by Jack Lovelock of New Zealand.

At the height of Cunningham's 4:04.4 achievement was at the height of Cunningham's career.

It is most probable that the march toward the four-minute mile will be continued this summer. Competition in the mile and 1500 meters will be unusually keen in college and national meets leading up to the I. C. A. games the last Friday and Saturday in May at the national college track championships at Los Angeles June 23 and 24, and the national A. A. championship in first or second Saturday of July.

Foreign invasion in completion of the events will be anticipated by prospects of making one of the three American mile makers in the national college track championships this summer. Princeton and Cornell are sending a combination team to England to compete in the Cambridge athletics. Bill Bonham of Princeton, who gave Cunningham his only major indoor meet loss in 1933, is virtually certain to be on this team.

A team of seven men, selected by the A. A. U. will sail for a European tour in mid-July. Cunningham is almost certain to be with this outfit.

Increased interest of fans in track and field events has been shown strikingly during the winter when five of the six major indoor meet records were established. The indoor season new world records were made in the high jump, pole vault, 100-yard dash, 200-yard dash, 400-yard dash, 800-yard dash, 1500-meter walk, and 1500-meter walk.

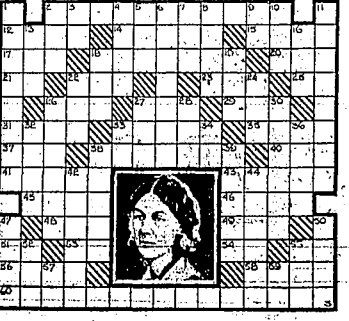

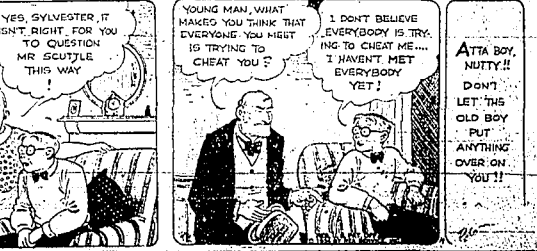

Night Driving No Big Problem If Lights Are Kept in Order

Credit Associations Begin on Northwest Applications for Cash Loans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Production credit associations in Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon are now receiving applications for cash loans from farmers.

Many of the associations in the four western states, known as the North Pacific States Production Districts, have been accepting the applications for a week or more. Next of farm and stockmen must be forwarded to the federal intermediate credit bank of Spokane for approval, Garwood explained.

The production credit associations are now being organized, but have become fully organized before being recognized by the parent office at Spokane. Their records may be sent for examination for part of the \$7,500,000 fund allotted to the administration district. They have been organized to cover from two to five counties, with headquarters centrally located.

Idaho Has Five

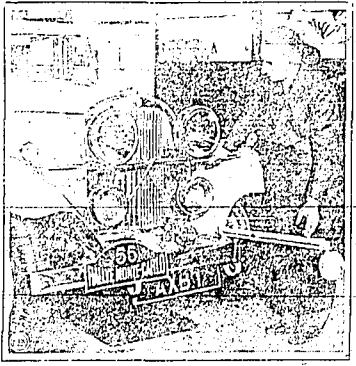
Idaho has five associations, Montana 11, Washington 8 and Oregon 4, as yet no records have been formed around state-wide production units already recognized, such as the Idaho Livestock Production Credit Association, making loans to livestock producers only.

The newer loans will be handled through statewide organizations, the commission said. They may will be the same as the needed, new stock or other necessities for their product. Smaller associations will be organized for loans for smaller livestock loans, and those to farmers for production of dairy products and other agricultural needs.

Become Members

Eligible farmers and stockmen may become members of the production credit associations in their district. They will be given a copy of the application of their loan application in "volving stock" of the association under proper security.

Loans will be made on time from three to 12 months, maturing on the 15th day of the following period of the product financed. Loans on breeding livestock and on the long term will not exceed three years.

PHONE CIRCUIT OF GLOBE SEEN

U. S. and Tokyo Link Expected Soon to Complete Voice Girdling of World

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Around the world telephone conversation, linking men's voices in every important capital and commercial center, is imminent, according to engineers who are checking this week the 50th anniversary of the first voice transmission on electric waves.

Already the earth is completely encircled by chains of telegraphic connections from the United States—made across the Pacific with Alaska—and across the Atlantic through Amsterdam, Berlin or Brussels to Manila again or other eastern oceanic points.

Final Link

But working connections through Tokyo and Shanghai to the United States and Oceania are still needed to complete the link between the great center of population.

The principal missing link between the United States and Tokio is rapidly being forged and probably will fit into the chain before the end of the year, according to engineers here. Some authorities expect it within two or three months.
