SENATORS DRAFT TAX SAVING FOR SALARY EARNERS

Finance Committee Prepares To Report Bill Aiding Employed Group

INVESTORS HIT HARDER Proposed Statute Will Save Married Man Substantial Sum Next Year

By H. O. THOMSON WASHINGTON, Mar. 22 (AP)—The man who works for a living is going to be taxed less in the future than the man whose income comes from investments, it became apparent today as the Senate Finance Committee prepared to report the new tax bill to the senate.

The house has passed the bill. At it shapers up for presentation to the senate it will be a measure designed to obtain revenue from the investing class rather than those who work for a living.

Married Man Saves For instance, if the present form of the law is approved, the married man with \$10,000 income pays \$20 next year in income taxes compared with what he is paying now. But with the law as it stands, the married man living on investment income will have a heavier share of the tax burden.

Lowering of the surtax rate has been effected to include dividends and partially tax exempt securities. The new law is not susceptible to ordinary income taxation.

Avoids Burden In lowering the surtax rate, the new law will exempt a man with \$10,000 of income who has been taken to avoid undue taxation. The new law will be actually earned, in contrast to (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

COMPETITION IN LAMBS FORECAST

Halo Views California A Contesting Market With Idaho Product

Study of livestock marketing conditions in San Francisco reveals that strong competition to Idaho spring lambs will be found there this season, and that a better, better type of lamb, more uniform in size, color, and texture, is being raised on the coast, according to Harry S. Hale, county extension agent, California, who is visiting after several days spent on the coast.

He accompanied a hog shipment there a week ago. First California fed spring lambs already reached the market and brought \$10.50. Hale says. The crop will be large and the quality good. Heaving conditions in California are also ideal, he reports.

See Competition Many growers there will hold back lambs to market before the spring season, and for this reason he fears they might compete with Idaho lambs. Hale should be ready for market as early as May 20. Packers are contracting for California lambs for immediate delivery; up to 6 cents for 100 lbs. and from 8 to 9 1/2 cents for 120 lbs.

Deal Deal California steers are bringing \$16, and the market is brisk. There will be large supplies of steers, he reports. Packers are discriminating against heavy-slim-type and want fat, well finished ones.

The government is required to publish the call quarterly on the condition of national banks and as many more are up today for the call than 11 years ago as few as three calls have been made only in 1926, 1932, and 1933.

Section 7A Under Recovery Act Basis of Current Strike Threats

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22 (AP)—Section 7A of the national industrial recovery act, basic legislation in most of the current labor troubles, today.

"Every one of labor competition, competition and labor competition, prescribed or issued under this title shall contain the following conditions:

"(1) That employees shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and no employer shall interfere with, restrain or coerce employees in the exercise of these rights.

"(2) That no employer shall discriminate in hiring, promotion or other conditions of employment on the basis of race, color, religion, sex or national origin.

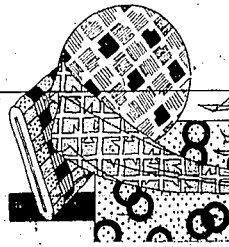

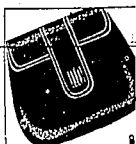
