**CWA BENEFITS**

With the CWA's days numbered, it becomes more and more apparent just how important that program was in the economic scheme of things this past winter.

Locally, it is inevitable that the absence of the large pay rolls of last winter will be felt. But there should be thankfulness for the benefits which went to those in need.

Aside from the cost of the program to the government, with the resultant social benefits, it is a good time now to take stock of the permanent improvements which are to be seen in each community.

Many of these will endure and be constant reminders of the extreme measures taken to start recovery in this country.

Under the new set-up it is expected that Twin Falls county will continue to fare satisfactorily, for the county is classed as urban, and in this state such counties will be favored in the distribution of relief funds.

**DEMOCRATIC IDEALS**

Several prominent Englishmen recently united to make a public protest against the rising wave of discontent with democratic institutions.

All across Europe—from Germany, from Russia, from Italy, from Austria, and from lesser countries—comes a steadily growing chorus of denunciation for parliamentary government.

Democracy, it is said, is a worn out thing, and liberty is an empty word; only by an iron-clad dictatorship can a people hope to meet the problems of the modern world.

All this, naturally, is beginning to stir echoes in the British Isles—and these Englishmen, therefore, have called on their countrymen to rally in defense of the democratic ideal and to reaffirm their conviction of the supreme importance of human liberty.

Something very similar might be done profitably on this side of the water. Europe is a long way off, but this attack on the old, Anglo-Saxon concept of freedom is a menacing and contagious thing—chiefly, perhaps, because we have grown so used to the blessings of liberty that we take them for granted.

If we don't like the actions of our mayor, our congressman, our governor, or our president, we wait our chance to vote against him at the next election—and, meanwhile, express ourselves as bitterly as we choose to anyone who will listen.

We read such books as we wish to read, attend whatever church we please, educate our children in the way that seems best to us.

We don't look on these things as privileges. They are part of our daily life. We hardly can conceive of living under circumstances where such things do not exist.

Yet we need to remember constantly that these are the very blessings of democracy which now are under attack. People fought and died that we might have these privileges, and did it so effectively that we no longer look on them as privileges.

We imbibe freedom with the very air that we breathe, but a price was paid for it, and it is our task to defend it everlastingly.

Under fascism, under communism, under any kind of dictatorship, we would lose it.

**OUR SCHOOLS**

American schools, says Prof. Albert Einstein, have one great virtue—they preserve the initiative and independence of pupils far more successfully than do the schools of Europe.

"What one must demand from the school in the first place is something negative," says the great mathematician. "It should not suppress in the young a feeling of independence, a joy of living, personal initiative and the urge for knowledge."

"This most important demand the schools of the United States fill in most satisfactory manner, in contrast to the schools of the greater part of Europe."

Usually, when American schools are compared with European schools, the comparison is not in the least flattering to the American institutions.

It is exceedingly interesting—and encouraging—to find that as great an authority on such matters as Dr. Einstein feels that they are doing "their job" as well.

### SILVER MEASURE HAS TRADE AIMS

Congressional Action on Dies; Bill Intended to Help Farm Exports

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23.—National desire for a liberal trade policy afforded a fifth harvest for every farmer leader has given impetus to the drive in congress for silver legislation.

The old traditions of silver shipping, custom manufacturers and the tea trade hover about the capital as if the silver question were a supreme effort for a Pacific commerce from world depression.

Trade considerations of the bill to permit the export of silver at a premium up to 25 per cent for surplus farm commodities can be moved in large degree by trade considerations.

Representative Martin Dies, D., Texas, sponsor of the bill, said in a United Press that his enactment would give a healthy stimulus to trans-Pacific commerce by increasing the disposal of surplus 4,000,000,000 in surplus farm commodities in the next few years, and aid the economic recuperation of China and other countries.

Aids Private Exporters

The Texas congressman called special attention to the fact that his plan could be used not only by the proposed agricultural commodity exchange board, but also by private exporters.

Under the bill, he explained, any exporter could deposit at the treasury silver received at a premium in payment for agricultural surplus products sold to foreign buyers, and receive silver certificates.

He thought that relative preference of his bill to the agricultural committee, instead of handling currency was favorable to an early report. He predicted that if the bill comes to a Senate vote, it will pass.

### REVISIONS LOOM FOR LOAN FIRM

Reorganization Plan Nearing Required Quota Among Stockholders

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Mar. 23.—Speedy reorganization of the \$25,000,000 Western Loan & Building company was in progress today following announcement that 75 per cent of the stockholders had approved the plan.

J. W. Jones, examiner for a conservatorship under John A. Malin, Utah bank commissioner, who 75.45 per cent of the 21,000 stockholders had agreed to the plan of reorganization of the concern over a recently selected board of directors.

The company operates in Utah, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, California, Oregon, Washington and Nevada. It made loans almost exclusively on business buildings, the major portion of the outstanding loans being on California property.

Seventy-five per cent approval from stockholders was necessary, Jones predicted that written approval will be received from more than 80 per cent.

It was estimated by Jones that from 30 to 60 days time would now be required to complete other details of reorganization.

The company was closed August 17, 1933.
