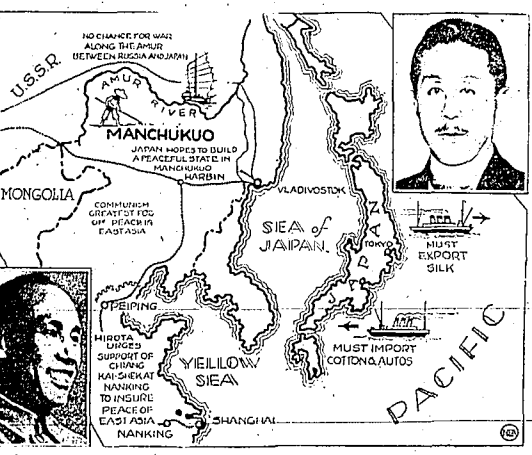

Twin Falls high school track and field aspirants swarmed Lincoln field today for the opening gun in the 1934 cinder campaign. Athletes representing each of the four classes swung into competition at 3 p. m. for the annual meet which will close at the termination of school supremacy and at the same time give Coach R. V. Jones and his staff a definite line on the material available for the Bruin varsity squad.

POLITICS
 The direct conflict that can arise between partisan politics and the public interest was never better illustrated than in the current congressional row over the Norris amendment to the Home Owners' Loan corporation bill.

Here, as clear-cut as such a thing could be, is a case in which the claims of politics run directly opposite to the needs of the nation as a whole. The difference between a public servant and a politician could not get a better demonstration.

The new bill makes certain changes in the HOLC law, guaranteeing the \$2,000,000,000 in bonds which the corporation may issue to protect hard-pressed home owners.

Before the bill got by, Senator Norris of Nebraska tacked on an amendment which would prohibit political considerations from playing any part in the choice of employes for this corporation.

The senate, after much prayer, fasting and beating of breasts, adopted this amendment by the margin of just one vote. Then the bill went to the house where the banking committee immediately struck out the amendment.

There is not any question about the rights and wrongs of this amendment. A corporation that can issue two billions in bonds to home owners can do a very great work, if it is directed properly; and it can accomplish an uncommon amount of very useful penning if its personnel happens to be made up of political hacks.

Why, then, did the amendment have such rough sledding? The answer is plain as the nose of one's face. Congressmen need to be able to pass out jobs to their henchmen to make their re-election easier. This corporation offers many new jobs; from the political viewpoint, it would be insane to pass up this chance for party profit.

The federal government has taken on many more activities than it ever indulged in before. These activities touch us all very closely; they affect our wages, our jobs, the prices we pay for necessities, the conditions under which we work, the homes we live in.

It is of the highest importance that they be conducted as efficiently as is humanly possible.

It is getting to be an annual gamble as to whether or not Governor Ross is going to prolong the time for the payment of auto licenses. Under the regulations motor vehicles cannot be operated legally on 1933 licenses after Saturday. It is an even bet whether or not he will extend the period for another 30 days, as he has in the past.

ANOTHER INSULT

MESSAGES FLOOD KAHN RESIDENCE

Condolences from All Parts of World Mourn Death of Financier

Chicago, Mar. 29 (AP)—Messages of condolence from all parts of the world poured into the magnificent Fifth avenue home where J. P. Kahn, banker, patron of the arts and philanthropist, lay in death today. They came following programs in all walks of life for such luminaries who shared man's world, and were accounted to as heart-rending in the offices of his international banking firm, counted among his intimate friends, starting at home and abroad, and the "theatrical" and "artistic" sphere and in the world of art and in society.

His death came as a distinct shock to Wall Street, which was regarded not only as an intimate financier, but as an authority on economic, taxation and international affairs. He was stricken with a heart attack while in his study in a private dining room in the offices of Kahn, Loeb & Company, yesterday. Rumors of his death were rapidly passed through the financial community, but confirmation was withheld until 2 p. m. when the market closed.

Physicians who arrived within a few minutes after the collapse collapsed him beyond aid. Dr. H. S. Hyman, Kahn's personal physician, explained that the financier had been suffering from general arterio-sclerosis in recent years as well as high blood pressure. Mrs. Kahn and Roger Wolfe Kahn, a son, who was an orchestra leader and aviation enthusiast, were at home when word of the tragedy was telephoned. Mrs. Kahn collapsed and a physician was called to attend her.
