TAX REVELATION

One of the most ominous signs of the year is one that so far has gone almost unnoticed—a little disclosure made in compilation of the most recent income tax statistics.

These statistics show that whereas corporation taxes are up almost 50 per cent over last year, collections from persons taxed on incomes of less than \$6500 a year have shown an actual decrease.

At the same time, taxes collected from persons earning more than \$5000 a year rose sharply, along with the corporation taxes.

All this shows a growing concentration of wealth in the hands of the middle and upper income groups, and a decline in the position of the ordinary, middle-class citizen.

It's a tendency which ought to be viewed with a good deal of concern.

POPULAR IDEA

One of the most interesting stories of recent months is that told by Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins in explaining the rise of the NRA.

As soon as President Roosevelt took office, she explains, people began writing him letters giving their ideas of how to restore good business conditions.

Not less than 100,000 people—most of them comparatively humble circumstances—wrote such letters to the President and members of his official family; and the vast majority of letters urged two fundamental changes—shorter working hours and the payment of wages above the mere subsistence level, to build up mass purchasing power.

It was from his perusal of these letters, Miss Perkins says, that the President got the germ of the idea around which the NRA was built.

GETTING DOWN TO FACTS

The congressional request that the Federal Power Commission make an elaborate survey of electricity rates throughout the country—to ascertain, among other things, exactly how rates charged by publicly owned plants compare with those charged by private concerns—sounds like an exceedingly sensible move.

For many years we have been hearing a good deal about the difference between these rates. On the one hand we have been told that the publicly owned plant offers consumers a vast saving; on the other, that such plants are wasteful, extravagant, and inefficient, and that their rates are really no lower than those of private companies when all factors are properly considered.

This survey ought to enable us to settle definitely just which arguments are correct. We can tackle the entire power question a lot more sensibly after this survey has been completed.

REASSURING MANUEVER

There is something reassuring about the United States fleet's departure from the Pacific coast for Atlantic waters.

During the last year or so we have heard a great deal about the danger of war in the Far East. We have been asked to spend a huge sum in putting our navy in tiptop shape, the idea being that times are so unsettled that we can't tell just when we may have to use it.

But this movement of the fleet is a good sign that the situation isn't as bad as it was painted.

The government would not pull the entire fleet around to the east coast if it had any reason to believe that it might at any moment be called on to fight in the Pacific. The movement ought to do a great deal to quiet our fears—and, incidentally, to help quiet the fears of other nations as well.

MORE SOVIET BUSINESS

The first dollars and cents fruits of Russian recognition are beginning to be reaped by American business men, according to figures just issued by the U. S. Commerce Department.

American exports to Russia during February, it develops, totaled just less than \$1,500,000—which may not be an unusually high figure, as exports go, but which compares very favorably with \$321,000 in January, and which is nearly three times the sum recorded for February, 1933.

Not all this increase, of course, is due to government recognition of Russia. Part of it undoubtedly reflects the general rise in business conditions.

But there is, nevertheless, justification for the belief that recognition is ultimately going to mean more dollars in the pockets of American manufacturers.
