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CHINA ATTACKS JAPANESE MOVE AS ASIA THREAT

"Hands Off" Policy Termed
Grave Danger to Peace
In Orient

NOTE AUTOBIOGRAPHY TOLD
Tokio Foreign Chief Admits
Second Warning, Denies
First Statement

BEIJING, China, April 26 (UP)—China has been told of violence at Japan today, while at the same time a government spokesman claimed that Washington was sending a note to Tokyo demanding an explanation of the Japanese declaration of "hands off China."

A government spokesman, broadcasting from the powerful Nanking radio station, said in part:

"Regardless of what explanation Japan offers, she is responsible for the danger she has created for China."

"No nation can infringe on the cooperation given to China by the powers and the League of Nations. No country can interfere with the open door policy. Japan's declaration of policy constitutes the gravest danger to the peace of Asia which Japan pretends to preserve."

TOKIO, April 26 (UP)—Foreign Minister Koki Hirota personally admitted responsibility today for a statement asserting that Japan intended to interfere in China in the interests of eastern Asia peace and independence.

The statement for which the Japanese foreign minister claimed responsibility today, was issued here today, three days after a less conciliatory statement pronounced Japan's move direct warning regarding foreign activity in China.

In connection with Chiang Tiao-Ping, the Chinese minister, Hirota reportedly explained that he had stated the Japanese position in the Huihui city Friday at 8 p. m.

The 10 percent proposal was sent back to the house for a vote which was expected to result in defeat for the Senate plan to raise \$55,000,000 from this "recovery tax."

Natural reluctance of congressmen to vote additional taxes in the year and the administration's assurance that extra taxes were not needed were expected to bring such an outcome.

Hundreds of citizens offered their assistance to officers and many were sworn in as deputies. Cowboys rode into town with their six-shooters strapped to their sides.

Citizens of Tucson said they were not at all alarmed by the kidnapping. A house to house search in the vicinity of Tucson was started. All passing automobiles on highways were stopped and searched by guards.

RANSOM DEMANDED
Tucson, Ariz., April 26 (UP)—Tucson police, who last captured John Dillinger and his band of outlaws, today demanded a \$20,000 ransom for the abduction of John Robles, 6, daughter of a wealthy Arizona family, and demanded \$15,000 ransom.

The child was seized as she was returning home from school yesterday. The kidnapper threatened to shoot the child unless the money was paid within two days.

Three suspects, a salesman and two university students who were arrested last night, were released today when officers were convinced they had nothing to do with the case. While the three were questioned they were guarded closely against possible violence in the same jail that housed Dillinger and three henchmen.

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SAVANT EXPLAINS DUST, WEATHER

Says Volcanic Clouds Travel
Around World, Produce
Climate Effects

WASHINGTON, April 25.—(AP)—Volcanism in Iceland or Alaska may help make weather in Kansas and Pennsylvania, Prof. W. J. Humphreys of the United States weather bureau told the American Geographical Union today.

Terrific explosions of these volcanoes hurl vast clouds of fine dust far into the air. The amount of ejected material is estimated by the cubic mile in such explosions as that of Katmai in 1912, and the dust, carried many miles high in the upper atmosphere, may float around the world for several years before it all settles.

Volcanic dust, if present in the upper atmosphere in sufficient quantity may cause chill, rainy summers and adverse winters, together with the appearance of strange rings around the sun and blood-red sunsets.

The reduction in temperature and in the amount of sunlight reaching the earth, is not ascribed directly to absorption of the sun's radiation by the dust, Dr. Humphreys explained. The effect of the dust, he said, is mainly a scattering of the rays.

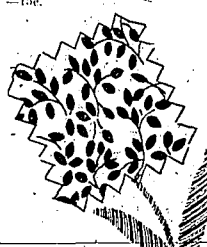

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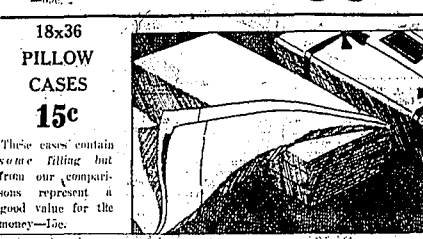

CODE ON COPPER MADE EFFECTIVE

Seven of Members Selected For Group Enforcing NRA Program

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—The copper code went into effect today with seven of the 11 men constituting the code authority selected and copper producers and custom smelters busy filing their price schedules with the code authority.

Of the four members of the code authority still to be selected, two will represent the public, seven already selected are: E. T. Stannard, president of the Kennecott Copper Corporation; Louis Cates, president of the Phelps Dodge Corporation; C. P. Kelley, president of Anaconda Copper Mining Company; Francis M. Bremer, chairman of American Smelting & Refining; Bernard N. Sinia, director of United Verde Copper Company; and Albert E. Pfeifferman, general counsel, United & Hecla Consolidated Copper Company.

Single Sales Agency

A single selling agency for all copper sold in this country will be set up under the code and quotas, based on the annual capacities, will be allotted to the various companies. Some companies, it was reported, are ready to file protest against certain provisions of the code, but in the meantime will take part in the formation of the code authority.

Copper men were reluctant to predict what the price of the metal will have on the price of red metal. It was conceded, however, that copper will be sold under 800 cents a pound, the code, under present conditions, of producing the metal in this country. It was pointed out that if the code is accepted by the whole industry, the price of the metal will be determined almost entirely by the code authority.

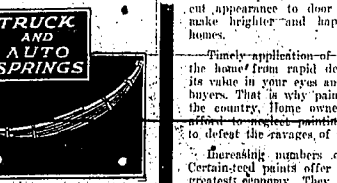

EVANS FREE ON JURY'S VERDICT

Young Mahoon Acquitted at Trial for Caldwell Slaying

Gandhi threatened to do penance, probably a three-week fast, but still because of the attack.

The attack was the first ever made on Gandhi. Those with him were members on the Indian nationalist congress.

Gandhi said he thought he would undergo penance, if not for the attack because of his failure to break down the opposition to his demands that the stigma be removed from the untouchables, returned by caste members. He took the attack as meaning that caste members were unmoved by his plea.
