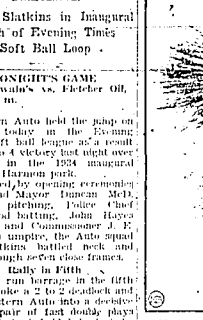

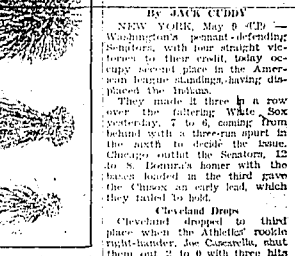

CITIES OF IDAHO COVER GOLD SORE. BOISE, Idaho (C)—Millions of dollars in gold, lying in quantities large enough to warrant large-scale mining, is buried beneath the city's streets, according to Dr. John W. Finch, University of Idaho professor and state director of mines travel. "I'm convinced by thousands of prospectors who have searched nearly every gulch in the Idaho mountains that there are large quantities of 'yellow pay dirt,'" Dr. Finch said. "The only thing that has kept it from being developed is that it is covered by cities. It was swept there long ago by running water of the great valleys, and the cities are now changing their courses." The United States geological department has estimated that there are about 500,000,000 ounces of gold in the state, and that there is a possibility of producing 100,000,000 ounces of gold in the next 10 years.

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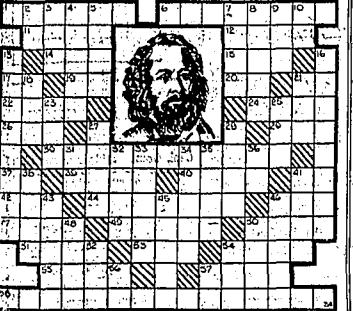

BOISE'S JOBLESS DEMAND REFORM

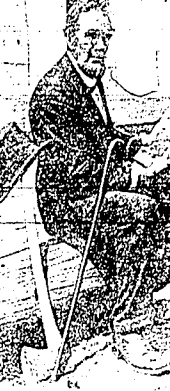
Demonstrators Offer Request For Changes in State FEPA Set-up

BOISE, May 9 (AP)—Boise unemployed made a peaceful and orderly but impressive demonstration yesterday. Several hundred strong, they gathered on the capital steps, asked for and received an encouraging talk from Governor Ross, then marched to the state headquarters of the FEPA in a downtown office building and presented to State Director E. P. Hurfall a summary of definite reform demands.

A hundred dirt wagons such as have been employed on relief road projects were in the parade, each carrying half a dozen men. Over 100 persons marched on foot.

"This nation need not be afraid of its radicals, but of its ultra-conservatives," Governor Ross told the gathering. A hundred years ago conservatives opposed education for the common people. Now the government is obliged to furnish employment for all who wish to work.

LINCOLN KIN

PWA FINDS HIGH BUILDING COSTS

Increase in Materials Prices Necessitates Enlarged Allowments

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Sharp increases in building costs, resulting largely from the NIRA, are costing another recovery agency, the public works administration, considerable sums for increases in public works loans and grants now presented here.

Faced by this situation, PWA has dug into its pocket-book many times recently, utilizing additional funds for projects to save them from abandonment.

Over eight principal construction materials increased approximately 20 per cent from April, 1933, to April, 1934, according to the Associated General Contractors of America. With higher wage levels and material costs, this agency estimated that the increase in construction costs was over 10 per cent.

Voluntary Action

In a few instances allotments for public works have been recoupled at the request of the applicants, who found when bids were asked that their original estimates of money needed to complete particular improvements were inadequate. Not willing to go further into debt, they abandoned their plans.

Increased cost of construction, for also contract estimates, was evidence when bids were asked for a dormitory at Charleston, W. Va. Consequently, PWA raised a \$400,000 allotment to the West Virginia board of control to \$625,000. An allotment of \$22,000 for a reservoir at Danville, Va., was raised to \$26,000. Another for a water works system at Silverville, Mo., from \$42,000 to \$59,000.

The administration has been able to meet this condition because some political subdivisions, apparently having had no desire to obligate public funds, have cancelled their negotiations with PWA for loans and grants.

Governor Applauded

He was given an ovation. E. B. Black of Caldwell and E. A. Gray of Boise were spokesmen for the assembly, and asked Ross for a series of questions on discrimination under FEPA in allotting jobs to the less needy. Ross' answers and hearty approval of pay for administrative jobs about a relief state director.

After replying to referring to FEPA official orders from Washington, including the one limiting wages to "budgetary requirements."

"We got no satisfactory answer," Gray said afterward. "All that is left for us to do is to go over the heads of the state officials."

JEROME SCHOOLS CLOSING MAY 18

Douglas, of the First Baptist church, Twin Falls, will preach the sermon. Diplomas will be presented to 62 graduating seniors May 17, at 8 p. m. in the high school auditorium. The program will be presided over and presented by the members of the class.

There will be 125 graduates from the eighth grade, 100 of these being from the Lincoln school, 17 from Emmons, and eight from Pleasant Plains. A program has been arranged for them on May 15, at 8 p. m. in the high school auditorium. Rev. Mr. Constock, of Jerome, will deliver an address and the diplomas will be presented by J. C. Musgrave, chairman of the local school board.

IDAHO RECEIVES \$272,000 GRANT

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Federal Emergency Relief Administration Harry L. Hopkins has approved new grants of relief funds to seven states and Alaska.

Utah, \$319,500 for May, including \$306,000 for general work and rural relief, \$13,500 for national re-employment service, and \$10,000 for student aid. An additional grant of \$200,000 to assisting in a forest application.

Idaho, \$272,000 for May, including \$250,000 for general work and rural relief, \$22,000, transient, \$10,000, national re-employment service, \$6,000, student aid.
