ROAD TO BRIDGE HERE IS POSSIBLE

Public Ownership of Span Necessary, Says Engineer

Carl Chamberlain, federal bureau of highways engineer, said here today that if the rim-to-rim bridge north of here were owned by the county, state or some other public agency, he felt certain it would be possible to secure a federal appropriation for construction of a 20-foot roadway from the city limits to the canyon brink.

Private ownership by the structure is said to prevent such an appropriation.

Meyer Duncan M.D. Johnston, who returned last evening from Boise, said he was informed also that the improvement could be made under the conditions mentioned by Chamberlain, and toll charges continued, perhaps at a reduced rate.

It is known that proposals have been made to the state bureau of highways to take over the bridge by purchase, perhaps through a state bond issue, to be paid over a period of 20 years through the assessment of tolls at rates under those now prevailing.

### 4-H COURSE SET FOR JUNE 10-14

Club Members in Idaho Will Study Varied Subjects At Pocatello

(By District Club Agent)

Plans are being completed for the sixth annual 4-H club short course to be held in Pocatello, June 10 to 14. This short course is conducted on the campus of the University of Idaho, southern branch; the boys and girls being housed and fed in the college dormitories. To be eligible for attendance a boy or girl must be regularly enrolled in a club project.

The program is both educational and recreational, there being morning classes on subjects of interest to both boys and girls, periods of organized recreation in the afternoon and evening, and a picnic during the afternoon of the last day. Club members play games until 11 p. m. and they are served an attractive and appetizing picnic lunch.

**Varied Classes**

This year, club girls will have classes in baking and nutrition, canning, clothing, home planning, citizenship, and health. Boys will spend two mornings in classes in demography, the uses of rope on the farm, insecta, plant diseases, weeds, and farm accounts, and two mornings will be spent in judging livestock.

Club members are required to pay for their meals and transportation to and from Pocatello. The expense incurred in getting materials and books for the educational and recreational programs, however, is taken from appropriations budgeted for this year.

Arrangements will be made again this year for traveling facilities. Meanwhile, each club is urged to decide which of its members can go to the short course. Enrollments must be sent in two weeks before the opening date, and the fee should also be sent in at that time.

Those interested in the junior short course, should write to the district club agent, Burley, or to the county extension agent.

HOLLYWOOD, May 10 (AP)—Ill luck still dogs the footsteps of Patsy Kelly, who came to Hollywood from New York to enter the films.

The collapse of a bed was the latest mishap to befall the young actress, who escaped dramatic last year when an automobile backed off a southern California pier, carry Jean Malin, female impersonator, to his death.

Miss Kelly was filming a comedy scene with Hedra Todd and Eddie Foy, Jr. when the bed on which they were "lying" collapsed on her leg, she was given emergency hospital treatment before returning to work.

### SWEDEN'S NOMAD SCHOOLS UNIQUE

Travelling Classrooms Offer Instruction to Children Of Lapslanders

STOCKHOLM (AP)—The Swedish nomad schools for Lapsland children are unique institutions and offer many interesting features. A young Lapsland school teacher, Alice Holmstrom, recently gave an interesting account of her experiences north of the Polar circle, while here.

The Lopp children attend school during four and a half months of the year and roam with their parents and their reindeer herds during the remaining seven and a half months. While attending school they are lodged in wigwams, on which the pupils sit on holes in the roof lets out the smoke. A native housekeeper prepares food for the children and they are allowed to live their usual life, with its customs and peculiarities.

### New Jersey Honors Dogs Leading Blind

### BRITONS PROTEST AT MAIL SEARCH

Englishmen Ired Over Action Of Government in Steps Against Lottery

LONDON (AP)—The disclosure by the Royal Commission on Sweepsstakes and Betting that the British Post Office has opened 500,000 private letters in a search for tickets in the various Irish sweepsstakes has led to something like an uproar of protest from liberty-loving Britons.

Under the present law, any letter—written or printed—is sealed, on a written order from any Cabinet member, but several lawyers have written to the newspapers declaring that there is no authority for blanket orders opening all mail and sundry letters on a mere suspicion that they might contain tickets in the Irish lottery.

Dublin Letters Opened

But letters addressed to Dublin from Dublin are all scrutinized, according to the Royal Commission, and those suspected of containing tickets in the lottery are opened open. Any tickets found are confiscated, and any moneys found are returned to the sender. But there is no prosecution unless there is evidence that the sender is selling the tickets in Great Britain.

Law Can't Cure Liquor Evils
Back about 15 years ago the people of the United States got fed up with the inalienable greed of the liquor traffic and decided to fix things by passing a law—the 18th amendment.

In the succeeding decade they learned, to their pained surprise, that passing a law was not, in itself, quite enough.

Now, just as if they hadn't learned the lesson once, they seem to be studying it all over again.

Just as they got fed up with the legal liquor traffic before 1920, they got fed up with the illegal one before 1933. So they tried the same old remedy; they passed a law.

Oddly enough, they're finding out exactly what they found out once before. The prohibition amendment failed to solve the liquor problem; repeal likewise is failing to solve it.

In each case, the primary difficulty seems to be that old assumption that the battle is won once you get the right kind of law on the statute books.

Senator Borah leveled a terrific indictment against liquor conditions under repeal, in his speech on the senate floor the other day. But no citizen who goes places and keeps his eyes and ears open need have been surprised by what Senator Borah said.

The facts are notorious. Even in wet states bootlegging has not been wiped out, sales to minors have not ceased, the pledge to keep the old-time saloon from returning has not been kept.

When the final states were ratifying repeal of the amendment, it was a common wisecrack to say that "repeal is a good law if they can just enforce it."

Just why that should have been taken as a wisecrack is not quite clear; experience with the amendment itself ought to have shown that it was nothing less than a plain statement of an obvious truth.

So far, efforts to enforce upon the liquor trade the kind of standards talked about when repeal was pending, is hardly visible to the naked eye. Until such effort is made in an honest and energetic manner, the people have no right to be surprised by the abuses which have developed under repeal.

They ought to know by this time that passing a law is only a first step in any reform.
