MAJOR BILL SENT BACK TO SENATE HOUSE APPROVES

Early Upper Chamber Action Expected on Amendments Added to Measure

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—The administration's airmail bill went back to the senate again today. It passed the house after a record vote late yesterday.

As passed by the house the bill calls for a basic pay rate of more than 35 cents per air mile for transporting a mail load not exceeding 100 pounds.

Most important feature of the bill was creation of a commission consisting of five members appointed by the President to make immediate study and survey of all phases of aviation in the United States.

The proposal authorizes the postmaster general to let contracts for airmail routes of up to 20,000 miles and permits the establishment of schedules for airmail routes of over 40,000 air miles annually.

The administration's bill already has been passed by the senate but it was defeated in the house by a vote of 215 to 197.

SILVER PAYMENTS URGED BY EUROPE

Called Only Method Of Preventing Defaults

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Diplomats of some war debt nations suggested today that payment of silver offers the only hope of avoiding universal default by the 15 European nations which owe the United States debt payments.

Complete default would mean a halt to the interest of \$1,672,103.19 due on June 15.

Urges Silver Premium A measure by which the United States would accept silver bullion at a premium well above the market price in payment of the debt was proposed by a diplomat.

The ruling was based on the notion that, recently passed by the United States Congress, nations in default in whole or in part of their obligations to the United States.

Some European nations, particularly Great Britain which is in default on \$1,000,000,000 of debt, are in all parts of the world, have been anxious to avoid default.

Neither cabinet has discussed the problem since the Washington loan conference from Secretary Hoover's refusal to remove the default stigma. It was learned authoritatively here today that neither will do so before next week.

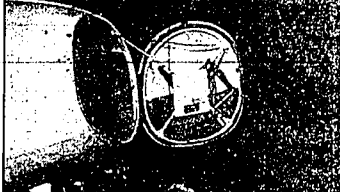


