RAIN BRINGS END TO LONG DROUGHT IN GRAIN AREAS

Farm Families Rejoicing Over Five Million Dollars Moisture Fall

RECORD DRY SPELL PAST Crop Loss Temporarily Halved Across Thousands Miles of Prairie Lands

CHICAGO, May 14 (U.P.)—Across a broad area of the central prairie and plain, ploughs bit into damp earth today and a million farm families rejoiced.

Whole families turned into the fields today at dawn. Small children as well as grandparents were expected to take instant advantage of the first dry spell early April when soil had been workable.

Reason for the jubilation was plain in dollars and cents. On the basis of crop estimates previously made yesterday's rain, which fell over almost the entire area of record drought, would at least \$5,000,000 to the farmers.

Department of agriculture estimates had placed the loss from wheat alone at nearly \$3,000,000. Corn and oats, as well as maize, rice and other grains were affected equally.

Dust storms, day after day, swept down from the ground in great clouds, and for weeks of weeks. Thousands of families felt hanging over them the threat of crop failure with the implication of loss of home and property.

May be insufficient Crop experts warned today that the rains yesterday, heavy in only a few places, might not be sufficient to break the drought period. (Continued on Page 2, Column 3.)

WYOMING PLANS MARK PLACE OF SPOT OF FIRST INDIAN, SOLDIER CLASH

CHEYENNE, Wyo., (AP)—A roadside sign will mark the site of the first major engagement in the Sheridan country between United States soldiers and Indians, the state department of commerce and industry has announced.

The sign, to be erected on Canyon road near Ranchester, Wyo., will say:
"On May 21, 1865, in 1865, on the banks of the beautiful Tongue River, a battle was fought between troops commanded by Gen. Patrick Connor and Arapaho Indians under Chiefs Black Bear and Old David. Six soldiers, four Arapaho and six Arapaho boys lost their lives in this engagement."
Opened Long War

"This, the first major engagement between United States soldiers and Indians in the Sheridan country, opened 11 years of warfare, during which occurred such fights as the Pieterman disaster, Wagonhead fight, Battle of the Horned, the Red Fox fight, and the Battle of the Little Big Horn. These encounters will look, places within 100 miles of here between 1865 and 1890. Here the original American flag first stood to retain the continent which started shipping from him in 1492, a celebration of 400 years of war, bloodshed, and broken treaties."

Already the Connor battlefield has been transformed by federal workers into a state park.

DEATH AX AIDS BRITISH REVENUE

Income from High Levy Goes Toward Current Expense of Government

LONDON (AP)—Replying to questions in the house of commons, the financial secretary to the treasury gave some final figures on the heavy death duties collected by the government during the past ten years.

The minister, however, gave figures on the net increase or decrease of the national debt each year. The two sets of figures in comparison show, in the main, that the revenue from heavy death duties goes for current expenditure, whereas a large section of the Conservative party and of the London press has long argued that revenue from death duties should be applied solely to the reduction of debt if the country is not to "live upon its capital."

Protests Federal Action in Ignoring Great Northern Variety on Bids

Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce has registered protest with the members of the Idaho congressional delegation in Washington over the recent action of the Federal surplus crop administration in calling for bids from local dealers for nearly a million pounds of pinto beans, when the Great Northern variety could be supplied at cost to the government of about 90 cents a hundred lbs.

Specification of the pinto variety, the chamber's communication points out, precludes dealers from this action in bidding.

"Furthermore, besides the price being greater for the pinto beans there is actually a greater surplus of Great Northern," at this time than there is of the pinto variety, which in a measure accounts for the price," the letter says.

A New Deal club is to be organized here this evening. It was announced today following the formation of club No. 2 at Piler last night. The first club was formed at Buhl two weeks ago.

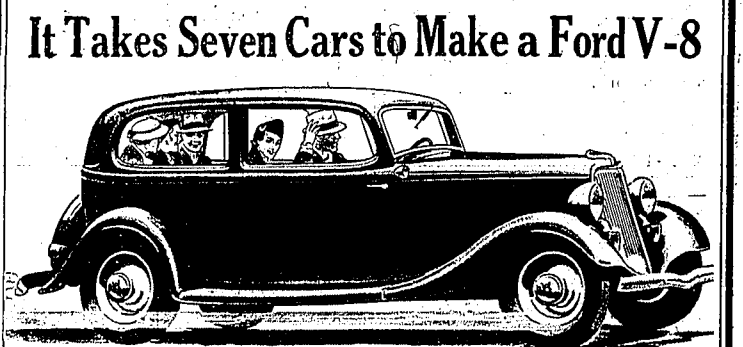
