FIVE CHAMPIONS DROP IN FINALS

NEW YORK, May 15 (AP)—Five former open champions failed to qualify for a crack at the 123rd title yesterday when more than 980 aspirants took part in 21 cities from coast to coast for the 109 vacant places in the National Open Golf championship at Atlantic City, Pa., June 7-9.

The former titleholders who failed were Willie MacFarlane (1925) and Cyril Walker (1924), both in New York district; Chick Evans (1916) at Atlanta; George Sargent (1909) at Richmond, and Fred McLeod (1903) at Atlanta, Va.

Big-Timers Quality.
A few former notables also failed to come through but the big-timers in general held up unusually well.

Phy Perkins of Cleveland, former British open champion, turned in the lowest card of the day, a brilliant 138 in 18 holes over the Baker Heights course at Cleveland, Blyth, Harke, U. S. open champion in 1921, registered a 140 over the same course.
