Washington Experts Join in Examining Clues Left at Desert Prison

TWO SUSPECTS WATCHED

Identification of Water Can Stolen Day Before Rescue Puzzles Searchers

TUCSON, Ariz., May 16 (AP)—An federal and state investigation today pushed search for kidnapers of eleven-year-old June Robles, as their child victim rapidly recovers from imprisonment in a hot desert box.

Experts from Washington joined Arizona and Tucson authorities in examining material clues and turning down leads impugned to the little girl's own story of 10 terrible days she spent in the kidnapers' hands.

She retained a slight limp from an ankle lacerated by the chain which bound her in the desert, nine miles from her home. The effects of exposure in blistering sun and scant improper foods almost had disappeared.

Trail Grows Warm Federal agents pursued a warning trail in the search with the identification of two garbage cans found in the desert, one of which the girl was liberated.

Two unnamed suspects both with police records were said to be under surveillance.

First results of the intensive investigation came when Steve Golan, a rancher, identified the cans as having been stolen from him on the night of the day before June was rescued.

Roberts Pursued The departmentalized investigators in view of the child's story that she spent the entire 10 days in the captivity in the cans and the last few days without seeing a visitor, one of the cans had produced a faint, illegible message. Many believed she was locked in the cans with a flashlight.

## ANOTHER DIGEST POLL

The Literary Digest, national news weekly, which of late years has gained widespread fame, is now embarking on a new kind of a straw vote. Twin Falls residents have already received a few of the early ballots, asking them to signify whether they "approve on the whole the acts and policies of Roosevelt's first year."

They are asked to answer with a simple "yes" or "no." On the card is a place for the voter to indicate for whom he cast his ballot in 1932. Not content with conducting a national, though entirely unofficial, vote on such matters as a presidential election, and the wet and dry question, the Digest now has the audacity to poll the people after the first year of Roosevelt, on whether they think his administration is o. k. or not.

"The thing is important only as it forms the basis for endless comment. In predicting the outcome of the poll, it is probable that the staunch supporters of the Democratic president will say that the vote will be overwhelming in his favor; while his opponents will perhaps take the opposite view."

"Since there is no direct issue right now, and because the ballot has little or any connection with the impending election, it is probable that fewer persons than usual will participate in the Digest poll."

"At any rate it will provide diversion through the summer, and, what is more important to the Digest, it makes a temporary circulation buizzer, and that is what it seems to need."

The Evening Times is in receipt of a 36-page booklet with cover printed on glazed paper and well illustrated, on the intriguing subject of "The Protection of Jointed Wood Products Against Decay and Stain." Just who is expected to read it is not explained. And it is published at no little expense by the School of Forestry of the University of Idaho!

## FRIENDLY GESTURE

The United States Congress will do a graceful and a gracious thing if it follows President Roosevelt's suggestion and orders returned to Canada the official mace of the parliament of Ontario, captured in the War of 1812 and now held at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis.

As the President points out, for more than a century these two countries have maintained a completely unarmed and unfortified border; and no man in his senses supposes that the next century will bring any change in this policy.

Whatever passions the war of 1812 aroused have died out generations ago, and any action that would help extinguish the last memories of bitterness would be a good one.

This mace does the people of the United States no good; it is doubtful if one American in 10,000 even knows his government possesses it.

To return it would be to emphasize the enduring solidarity of the friendly relations between the two nations.

## DIFFICULT DEED DONE
