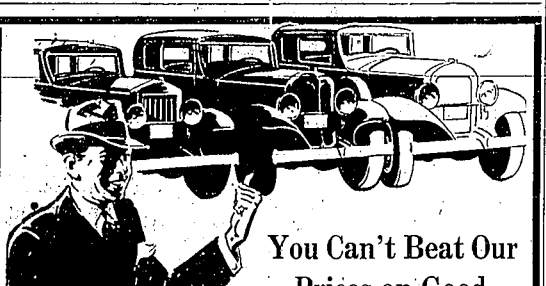

You May Not Know That—

PUBLIC ENEMIES
Two things stand out in connection with the arrest and sentencing to Sam Quentin of the men involved in the Gettle kidnaping case in California. One is that Jimmie Kirk and one of the women companions of the men, formerly worked here and was known to have been engaged in the illicit liquor business, giving the case a distinct local angle. The other, of course, is that justice moved unusually rapidly, with the result that the perpetrators of the dastardly act, not only confessed, but yesterday were placed behind the bars for long sentences. Everyone hoped that the Arizona culprits, whose fiendish desire for money led them to vent their brutishness upon little June Robles, would be apprehended quickly, so that justice again might be served. The sooner it is proved by the authorities that such criminality cannot be permitted to continue in this country, the better it will be for society as a whole. The Dillinger case is an unhappy example of the ends to which present-day criminals will go. When this public enemy is captured and suitably punished, there will have been a clarifying of the situation regarding lawlessness. It will see the federal government taking new legislative action to aid in the apprehension, conviction and punishing of vicious criminals. The nation will applaud the efforts and commend those who are able to frustrate the sort of crime of which the Arizona and California cases are the most recent examples.

Initial effort inaugurated at Buhl to put T. J. Lloyd of this city to the helm as western representative of the federal emergency relief administration is a commendable effort, and will doubtless meet with widespread approval throughout the state. Lloyd has proved himself capable in every position he has ever occupied, and his known integrity and fairness make him peculiarly fitted for the position as western head of the relief program. Typical of the man is the fact that he did not urge himself for the place. His admirers promoted the idea, and indications are that there is a possibility of securing his appointment.

CHECKING A NUISANCE
Herbert Hoover's rebuke of the young University of Pennsylvania freshman, who sought to impress the editors of his college paper by getting an interview with President Roosevelt, and a young upstart by writing to Mr. Hoover for help, is a volume that ought to get a wide reading. Mr. Hoover bluntly informed the young collegian that high government officials are busy men who don't have time for the amateur interviewers, autograph collectors, and other varieties of bright young men who buzz about their heads.

Every president has such ambitious but misguided youngsters to contend with. Mr. Hoover himself doubtless suffered from them in his own day. Now he seeks to squelch one who is trying to get at his successor, and in seeking to squelch him he has struck a blow in a good cause. The time of a president is too valuable to be wasted on young collegians who are out to show their own cleverness and initiative.

PRODIGAL'S RETURN
Samuel Insull's return to America makes a queer spectacle—a blending of the return of the prodigal son, the arrival at the jailhouse of a fugitive convict, and the advent of the captain back from the wars. The issues at stake in his indictment, his flight, his arrest, and his approaching trial are being overshadowed by the projection of his own personality. The whole affair is being dramatized, and it is being dramatized in the wrong way—as the case of one individual, and not the case of a system. For this trial ought to do more than simply tell us what kind of a man Insull himself was, in the days when he was mighty. It can tell us what kind of a country we were in those days, what sort of economic system we lived by, and how power was gained and used.
