U. S. Plans Renewed Borrowing Campaign To Finance Recovery

Present Abnormally Low Interest Rates Regarded by Treasury as Making Program Well Timed

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Immediate resumption of the government's borrowing program to take advantage of present abnormally low interest rates and provide the cash for the summer recovery drive is expected shortly.

Continuation of the government's borrowing program has enabled the government in the first half year to operate by only borrowing a third of its estimated \$2,000,000,000 needs. In addition it has been able to keep a comfortable cash balance in the treasury.

Large Reserve

The government now has in its vaults about \$1,200,000,000 in ready cash exclusive of gold dollar "devaluation" profits. With the bank's balance sheet showing a falling tide between now and the end of the fiscal year, June 30, it could operate several months without any new borrowings.

The treasury, however, has believed it best to take advantage of low interest rates for government bonds by rolling a huge cash reserve into the market. It would reduce possible borrowings in the following fiscal year. Also a considerable amount of money is being loaned to the government with those of a lower coupon rate.

By June 15

Bond market circles predicted today that the government would be in a position to issue \$1,000,000,000 in a billion dollar issue of long term 3 percent bonds. Holders of the \$1,200,000,000 in Treasury government bonds, which mature July 1, 1942, will be invited to exchange their securities for the new issue.

In a typical Dillinger fashion, three men swarmed into the Glenwood avenue branch of the Citizens and Commerce Savings bank, leaving two other men and a woman in an automobile, and escaped with the cash in sight before police could answer an alarm from a station two miles distant.

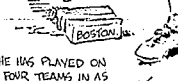

ROBERT M. MCCRACKEN

Death by accident of Robert M. McCracken, former Idaho congressman, who served in the House of Representatives during the Sixty-fourth Congress in the years 1915-16, takes from Idaho another of the comparatively few men in the Gem state who have risen above the commonplace.

He aspired to the congressional nomination again this year. Through a strange turn of fate he was the victim of a fatal accident Wednesday night which deprived him of even making the race.

McCracken was a visitor in this city only a short time ago and announced his decision to contest for the republican nomination. His sudden death brings to mind another similar accident two years ago when Miss Reta Martin, nominee of the Democratic party for state superintendent of public instruction, had her life snuffed out in an auto wreck in the eastern part of the state. Killed also was C. E. Bookout of the Albion state normal school.

McCracken was a reformer and civic leader, and while there was nothing in his career, as representative at-large from this state during a single term, to distinguish him, he was recognized as a potent force for good citizenship, an honorable citizen and a capable lawyer.

His influence was felt in Idaho as an ardent advocate of prohibition and in the present campaign he would have kept the issue alive and thus contributed to the advancement of that and other moral causes.

While many present-day Idahoans were not acquainted with Robert M. McCracken they can join in deploring the shocking death of one of their number who had served the commonwealth faithfully and honorably.

NEW IDEA IN EDUCATION

Projected experiments in primary education are always interesting. One of the most interesting is that recently suggested by Dr. Jay B. Nash, of the New York University School of Education, who urges that children begin their schooling later than is now the case, and that the start be made easier and more gradual.

Dr. Nash believes that eight years is about the earliest age at which a child ought to be sent to school; he also believes that more emphasis be placed on physical education in the primary grades, and less on such subjects as reading and geography, which place a strain on the eyes.

In this way, he feels, a child would be enabled to make such progress that by the time he was 10 he would have progressed as far as is the case under the existing system; and he would be sounder, mentally and physically, to boot.

It looks like a plan that is worth thorough consideration.

WAR'S LESSON
